A By-law to further amend By-law Number 1130 as amended by By-law Number 1158 being a Zoning By-law that regulates the use of lands and structures thereon.

The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Milton enacts as follows:

- That the Zoning Map forming part of By-law 1130 is hereby amended as follows:
 - By changing to M-1 the present C-1 zone fronting on the west side of Ontario Street North and extending from the northerly limit of the Town of Milton to the present southern boundary of the C-1 zone.

To Repair Kelso Swimming Dam Begin Stream Erosion Control

Members of the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority, at their recent meeting in Milton, made arrangements for further work on Authority projects through the watershed.

A committee of Dr. C. A. Martin, A. R. Service and Alan Day was named to supervise repairs to a small swimming dam at the Kelso Dam site. The dam is situated below the proposed new reservoir dam, and will be suitable for swimming.

Erosion Control
Another committee of Wilfred Bird, John Kobzyk and chairman Robert Marshall was named to supervise a \$4,000 stream bank erosion control project at the Sixteen Valley Conservation Area in Trafalgar Township.

Approval of the Department of Planning and Development was received for a \$1,850 survey and preliminary engineering study of the proposed harbour development stretching from the lake shore to the Queen Elizabeth Highway at Oakville. Oakville has been declared 95 per cent benefiting, and the remainder of costs will be shared by the four other participating municipalities.

Still Polluted

The authority decided to write to the Ontario Water Resources Commission, noting pollution still exists in the creek below Milton. Final arrangements were made for the purchase of gravel rights at the Kelso Dam Site from Peel Construction Co. Ltd., at \$2,000. The Authority and the Township of Nassagaweya are permitted to use gravel from the pit on the property. Peel Construction is negotiating with the Authority to purchase topsoil from the reservoir site.

A contract was signed with P. K. Kilborn Associates for detailed engineering drawings at the Kelso reservoir site.

Pond Grants

A committee was formed to consider grants on small farm ponds. It was agreed this committee will not interfere with pond grants by the County of Halton.

Stanley L. Hall, M.P.P. has announced the appointment of Grant Madill as Local Registrar for the County of Halton with Robert Shortall and Mrs. Margaret Gilbert as Deputy Local Registrars. These appointments will become effective October 1, 1960.

Urges Caution Diseased Trees

The co-operation of all elm tree owners will be needed to curb the outbreak in Southern Ontario. Anyone who owns elm trees should read this booklet to understand how the disease works.
