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Study Complicated Quandary

wondered if ratepayers concerned in the drainage scheme were prepared to pay their share towards the project. "We certainly can't put drainage on private property when we turned down assistance to ratepayers on Woodward Ave."

Deputy-Reeve John Charlton noted the project was not so costly if it wasn't tiled. "Anyone who has seen the water in the spring realizes something must be done."

The matter was to be considered further at another meeting. A decision on committee placements following the resignation of Art Desjardine was delayed until members of the original striking committee submitted suggestions.

Mayor S. G. Childs suggested the new Councillor Glyn Roberts assume Reeve Desjardine's committee. Councillor Johnson suggested the new Reeve should assume the Reeve's committees. Deputy Reeve Charlton noted a change of that kind would result in a complete shift of committees.

The decision was delayed to the next meeting because two members were absent.

**Recommend Protection**  
The Board of Transport Commissioners ordered the installation of flashing lights, bell and short arm gates on the Bronte St. crossing of the C.P.R. within six months. Cost of the \$38,560 project will be borne 80 per cent by the Railway Grade Crossing Fund, 12 1/2 per cent by the town and county and the balance by the C.P.R. Council indicated its approval of this protection.

Ontario Municipal Board approval of the debenture by-law of \$16,600 was received for the paving of Ontario St.

The Board of Transport Commissioners recommended consideration of signals at the Ontario St. crossing and ordered the C.P.R. to provide cost estimates on the installation.

A letter from Sandy Best M.P., reviewed current government action and welcomed any suggestions council might have.

**Test Drilling**  
Solicitor K. Y. Dick noted the approaching Ontario Municipal Board hearing on the town's application for rezoning to accommodate the Ontario Tree Fruits Co-operative on Ontario St.

Mr. Dick reviewed discussions with town planner P. Alan Deacon and suggestions on future zoning. He noted the recent Ontario Water Resources Commission report recommendation had included future test drilling. Mr. Dick suggested the town should begin shortly on that test drilling to determine the water potential of the area. "If Trafalgar beats us (in providing services to the north section of the township Milton as an entity is lost. We have to find water and move quickly. I think our continued corporate existence depends on it".

The part the Ontario Water Resources Commission might play in such a drilling program was discussed and members instructed the clerk to provide a financial report on the waterworks operations to determine if funds are available for initial test drilling.

**Paving Agreement**  
A by-law authorizing signing of an agreement with King Paving for the work on Ontario St. in the \$23,099 paving project was approved.

A payment of \$300 to the Milton Planning Board for operating expenses was approved.

The following accounts were approved for payment: welfare \$163.86; water \$185.60; sewers and sanitation \$1,214.73; fire, light and police \$20.80; properties and contingencies \$397.21; streets and walks \$1,699.07; capital \$517.20; finance \$5,820.34.

**Red, Not Yellow**  
During the adoption of the reports Councillor Johnson objected to the new garbage truck being in red instead of the present yellow. Mayor Childs reviewed that the foreman had suggested trying red to eliminate the hard-to-keep-clean yellow.

There was also a recommendation that the purchase of tires be made for town vehicles in town rather than from a Toronto firm.

The N.R.C. is the fundamental instrument and hinge of Government research and university scholarships in Canada. Mr. Best said that during the next session the committee's work will include a study of the present reactor controversy, fall-out and waste disposal problems.
