## RIGHT AROUND HOME

Another fair is over and we must say it is one of the best we've seen for awhile. The weather was perfect and from what we saw everyone seemed to be enjoying it with exception of a few youngsters who wanted an extra hot dog or an extra ride.

There seemed to be a good number of entries in all classes in the women's section. We are always interested to see these exhibits as a few years ago we were one of the exhibitors, but now with three small boys everything that gets made gets worn almost immediately and nothing gets made that isn't to be used. We hope in another few years to be back at it again.

It was surprising to see that entries came from many nearby centres and from as far away as Kitchener.

As always the baking looked

delicious. It makes you wonder how some of the exhibitors find time to do so much with entries in almost every class.

On the whole everyone we talked to agrees it was a successful fair.

If you enjoy homemade pickles there is still time to make a batch. Cucumbers, peppers and tomatoes are still on the market in great abundance. For a crisp cucumber pickle the Department of Agriculture suggests this tested recipe.

### Best Crisp Pickles

A recipe for cucumber pickles which speaks for itself in the name — Best Crisp Pickles.  
4 quarts sliced cucumbers (medium-sized)  
6 medium white onions, sliced  
3 cloves garlic  
1 green pepper  
1 sweet red pepper  
1/3 cup coarse-medium salt  
3 cups white vinegar  
5 cups sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons turmeric  
1 1/2 teaspoons celery seed  
2 tablespoons mustard seed  
Slice the cucumbers thin. Add sliced onions, garlic, and the peppers cut in narrow strips. Add

salt; cover with cracked ice; mix thoroughly. Let stand 3 hours, then drain. Combine remaining ingredients; pour over cucumber mixture. Heat to boiling point. Seal in sterilized jars. Makes 8 pints.

If you prefer a jelly type relish this is the one we enjoy, made from green and red peppers.

### Pepper Relish

2 cups prepared peppers (1/2 doz. green, 1/2 doz. sweet red)  
1 1/2 cups cider vinegar  
7 cups sugar  
1 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare peppers. Cut open medium-sized green and sweet red peppers, discard seeds. Put through food chopper twice, using finest blade. Drain. Measure 2 cups into a very large saucepan. Add vinegar. Add the exact amount of sugar. Mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; at once stir in fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim for five minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle into glasses. Cover at once with 1/4 inch hot paraffin. Makes about 10 medium jars.

Recipes for a number of other kinds of pickled vegetables and fruits are contained in Bulletin 468, Canning Ontario's Fruits and Vegetables, available from the Information Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.
