Blowing bubbles has amused children for many years. A drop of glycerine helps the process, and if no bubble pipes are availdrinking straws may be used. On a warm day a group of children can have a lot of fun in the back yard with a bubble blowing competition. The equipment is inexpensive, a bowl of soapy water and a drinking straw for each child-the plastic kind last longer than the waxed paper but must be sterilized each time after they are used.

Refreshing Fun On a very hot day children will beg to be allowed to run through the falling drops from a spray hose set up in the yard. If they are in bathing suits and there is a time limit on this activity it can be refreshing. Some mothers keep this as an occasional treat just before meal times and combine washing hands and face with changing out of bath-
