Police Force to Expand, Move

More miles to patrol, more men and a new home will soon grace the North Halton detachment of Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Milton.
When highway 401 opens westward from Highway 25 at Milton (and the rumored opening date is mid-November) the force will be adding another 9.7 miles of four-lane highway to their patrolling area.
Corporal Charles Wilkinson, who is in charge of the detachment, reported this week he had clocked the highway from Highway 25 to the Halton-Wentworth Town Line.
Soon to be 16
The detachment is currently short one man — a replacement for Const. Ray Andross who has taken over Milton's municipal force as chief of police. The Corporal said he expects a 16 man force will be patrolling the North Halton area in the near future.
Sometime later this month, the force will move from present crowded offices in the basement of the Children's Aid Society building, Brown St., Milton, to a new office on Bronte St., Milton. The new office is a former house beside MacNab and Son Ltd. funeral chapel, and is presently being renovated to the needs of the O.P.P.
