### Two International Foundation Students Speak to Rotary Club

University students Dr. Rah Gooneratne of Ceylon and B. S. Bhogal of Kenya outlined to Milton Rotarians Tuesday some of the major problems of their countries as the club held its Rotary Foundation meeting.

Under the Rotary Foundation members contribute \$5 yearly to the International foundation for students from one country to study for a year in another country in an effort to further world understanding and brotherhood.

Mr. Bhogal outlined the size of Kenya and its capital Nairobi, traced the early development through trade and construction of a railway, and reviewed the tribal beliefs and foundation and growth of the Mau Mau.

"Africans have an organized approach to life which was not appreciated by the western world", he pointed out.

"Asset to West" The uncertainty of the future after independence stopped a lot of capital from flowing into the country. "Now is the time to decide whether we are going to mobilize our energies and resources to help build up a country that could be an asset to the western world," he challenged.

Reviewing education Mr. Bhogal noted that for the next few decades there will always be room for men who could help build up the country with their knowledge.

Chief grievance of the African, cited by the speaker, was that the rate of development has left a desire not only to be free but to be on an equal basis. "I hope the Communist world does not succeed in undermining that hope

of the African", the speaker concluded.

#### Care for 10 Million

Dr. Gooneratne, at the University taking post graduate study, outlined the health problems of Ceylon and the difficulty the students of one medical school had in caring for the needs of the 10,000,000 population. Hospitals there, he said, are state operated and services not charged for with the exception of some private hospitals.

Main health problems are tuberculosis and venereal disease, Dr. Gooneratne stated.

In a brisk question and answer session members and the visitors ranged over South African membership in the Commonwealth, eventual unification of Africa, unemployment in Ceylon and the attitude of the western world to the developing nations of Africa.

The speakers were introduced by Don Merritt and thanked by Mike Ledwith.

#### \$500 for Retarded

Ian Flemming, chairman of the business section campaign for the Retarded Children's Association, announced a donation from Ontario Steel for \$500 on the basis of \$10 per employee. Milton's goal is \$10,700 in the bid to construct a new school, he reported as he asked the co-operation of all members in contacting local merchants and industry.
