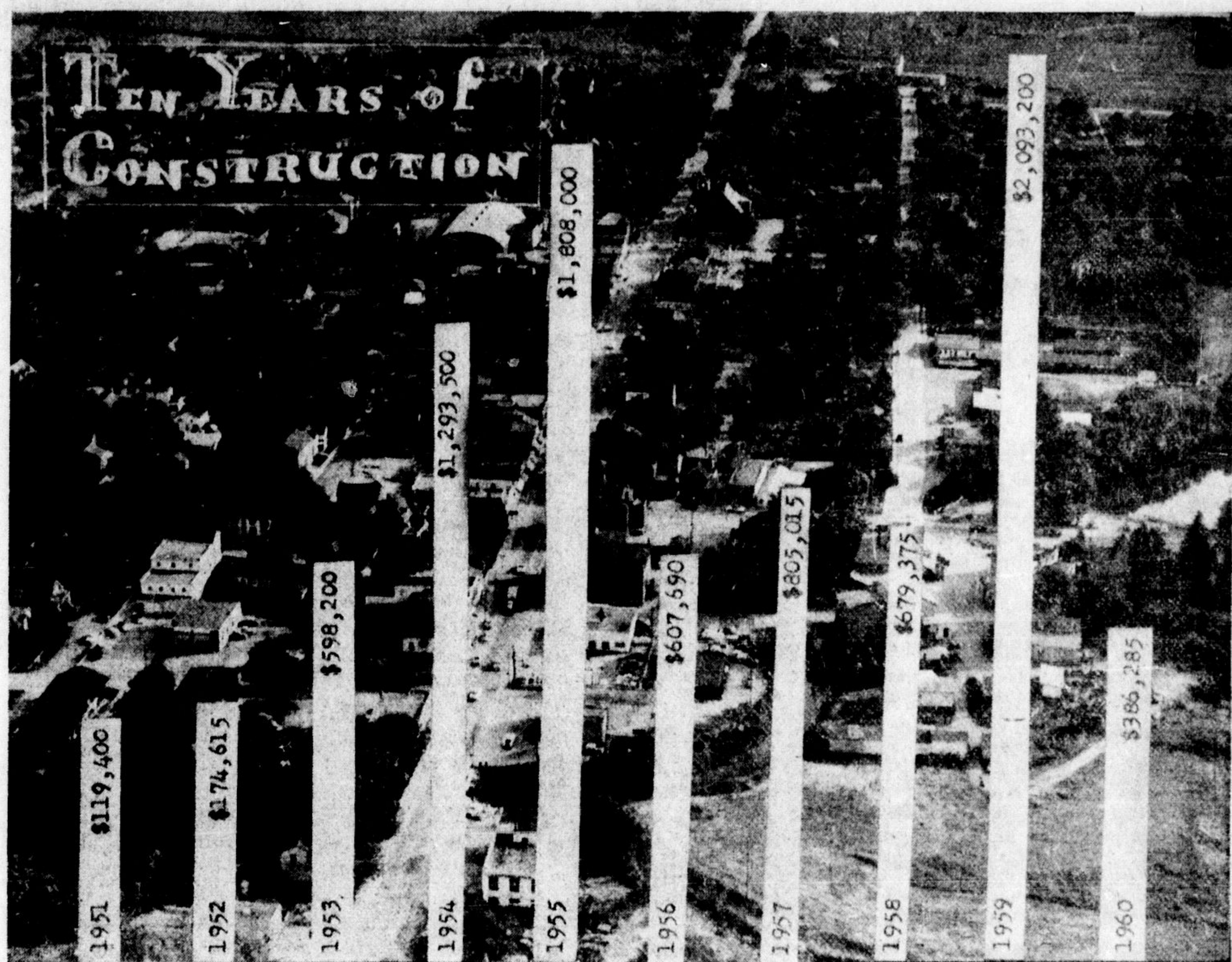

### 36 Die, 108 Married In Year-End Figures

Town office records to date show 36 deaths in Milton over the past year. Out of 54 marriage licences issued, 24 who went to the altar were from the Milton area.

The births are no longer being handled by Clerk Jim Costigan at the town office. The figures for the new arrivals are being taken care of by the Trafalgar township offices since the new hospital is outside the town limits.



1960 WAS A POOR YEAR on the construction scene in Milton, as the above graph (superimposed on an aerial photo of the town) shows. Over the past 10 years, construction ranged from a low of \$119,000 in 1951 to a new record high of over \$2,000,000 in 1960.

## Slow Trade in Construction

The town of Milton began its 196th decade with a slow trade in home, industrial and commercial construction. During the

past year, only \$386,285 worth of building permits were issued by building inspector Frank McNiven, marking the slowest year of construction since 1952 when the total was \$174,000. In the years between, 1955 hit a record \$1,808,000 and 1959 topped the former record with \$2,093,200 worth of permits issued.

Less home construction seemed to be the deciding factor in lowering the 1960 permits figure, as only 25 new residences were erected. Other major projects were the \$20,000 expansion at Ledwith's Food Market, a proposed front extension for Town and Country Antique Shop on Martin St. at \$10,000, and repairs to Milton Arena totalling \$2,000.

Two other projects for Milton, but assessed in Trafalgar Township, were the Matthews plaques plant and the Charles B. Copeland lumber firm.

The year 1960 started off slowly with \$2,250 worth of permits issued in January and \$600 worth in February. March picked up to \$30,900, then the next three months again dropped to \$14,000, then \$17,250 and \$16,200. July hiked again to \$38,100 followed by a dismal August with \$12,245,

### Record Construction Seen in Nassagaweya

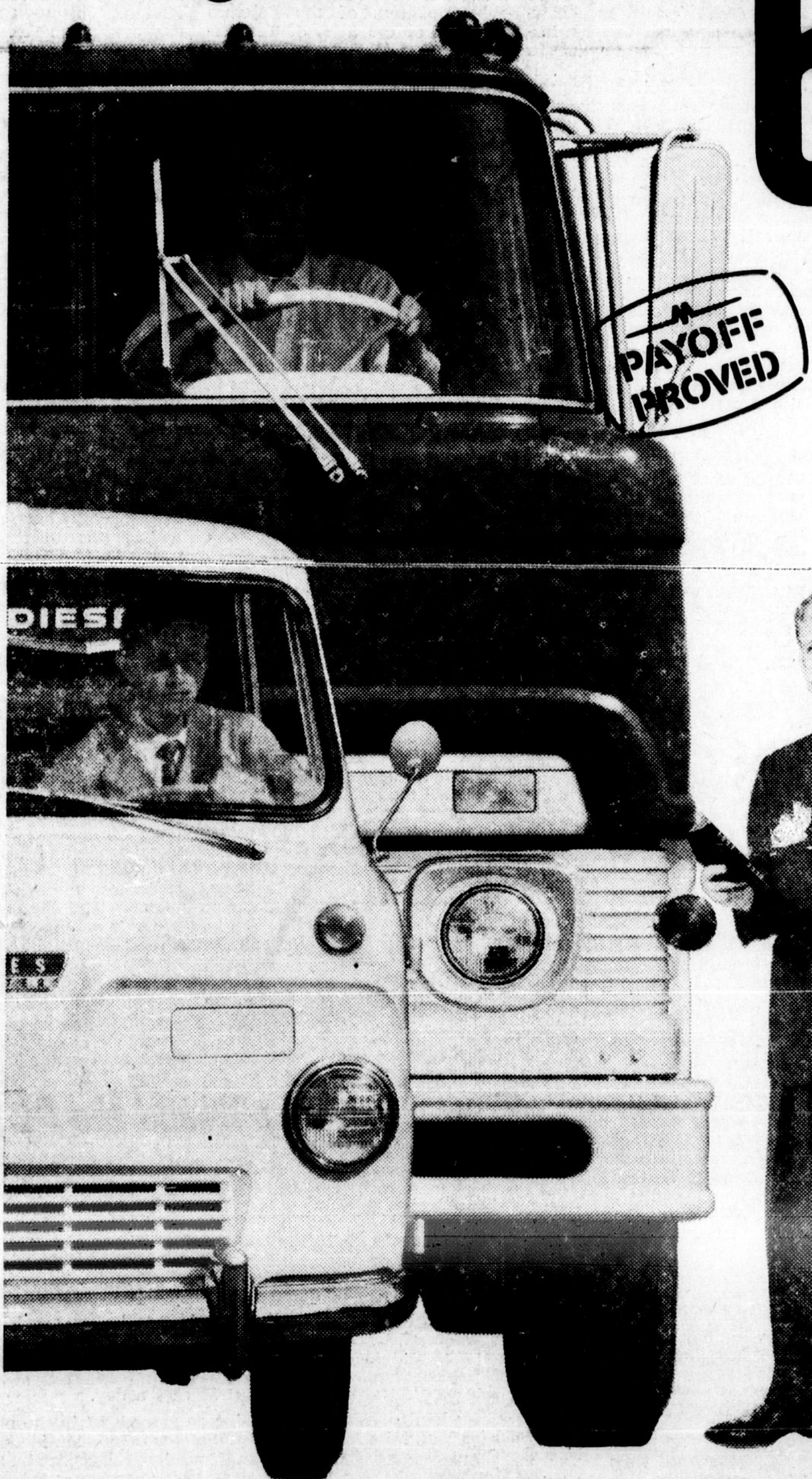
A record year for construction was witnessed during 1960 in Nassagaweya Township. At the year's end, clerk Don McMillan reports he issued permits for \$310,450 worth of construction, including one large school and several smaller projects.

The \$161,000 Brookville Public School was the township's largest project. Others included 12 homes, a Bell Telephone Building, one small industry, one barn, several garages, additions, cottages, and small farm buildings.



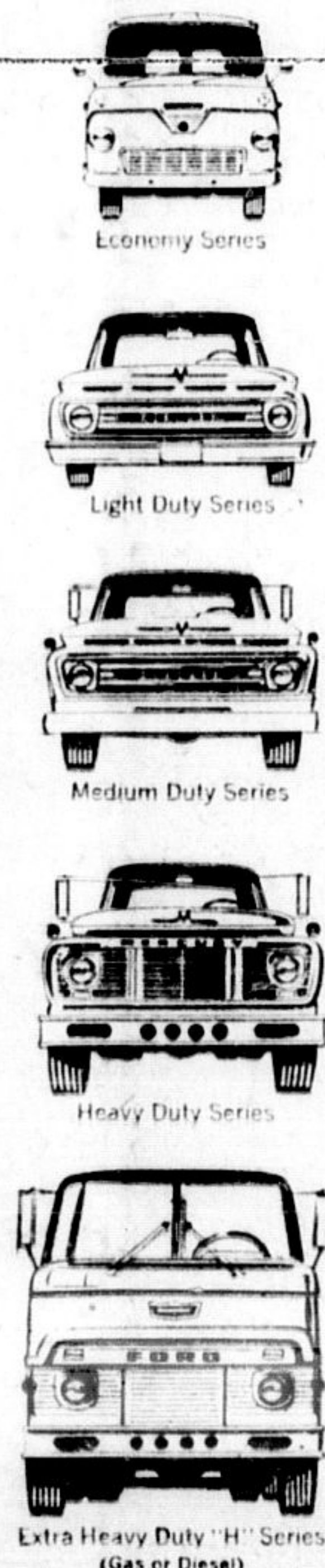
