# William Robert Pewtress, 91 Well-Known Hornby Resident

well-known active resident of the Hornby district for the past 83 years, William Robert Pewtress, 91, died on January 10 at Milton District Hospital following a brief illness.

Mr. Pewtress piled up an active record in the Hornby district before his death. Born in Don Mills May 23, 1869, he moved to Halton when he was eight, to the Lot 12, Conc. 5 Trafalgar farm where he spent 52 years. Married to the former Annie May Medforth in 1907, he later moved to R.R. 2, Hornby and spent the last 31 years of his life there. An active member of St. Clair Masonic Lodge 135 for 61 years, he joined in 1900, was Master in 1909, received his 50 year medal in 1950 and then in 1959, received his Past Master 50 'year jewel.
