Milton, Acton School Teachers See Physical Education Method

Teachers from five Milton schools and two public schools in Acton attended a special in-service meeting Wednesday afternoon in the Robert Little public school in Acton, and viewed a demonstration on physical education, staged by Doug Reid, supervisor of physical education for South Peel.

Mr. Reid brought four grade six pupils with him to show what one year's training could accomplish and then used several Acton pupils to demonstrate advancement with new pupils.

The demonstration and discussion proved most enlightening to everyone present and several ideas were gained by those in attendance.

Mr. Reid showed the basic elements in teaching physical education and told his interested audience he supervises 32 schools and only six of these has a gymnasium. His method of teaching is done right in the classroom and this was demonstrated as well.
