The sale was promptly closed with the customer beaming "I knew you tellows would come around . . . ". He then examined the second car (which looked identical) and signed the papers. It was not until then that the dealer, who happily was a reputable businessman, informed his customer that the second car was a former taxi with 87,000 miles on the setback speedometer (against 23,-000 actual miles on the first car) which he had planned to wholesale.

Offered his money back, the customer wisely decided an additional \$125.00 was a bargain price for a car with 80% of its life ahead of it against one with 80% of its life gone.
