Mrs. Nancy Ramshaw, Mrs. Elc-37 la Rocheforte, Mrs. Alma Colling and Mrs. Frances McCormack took 280 pounds of clothes to the United church distributing house, 100 Simcoe St. Toronto and spent the day sorting clothes.

The Distributing House serves from Halifax to Winnipeg as a gathering place for clothes for overseas missions. The clothes are first sorted for wear and soiled spots and then put into piles, men's, women's, etc. They are 150 Suffolk ewes, due in March then stacked in a cart. When the cart is full, the stack is put in a press and pressed tightly. It is wrapped in carboard and tied with three bands of wire. The bundle is then wrapped in heavy paper and then in burlap, ready to be shipped overseas.

Stockings to Korea

Nylon stockings are sorted out to be sent to Korea. Here 15 war widows earn their living by remaking these used nylons into useful products. They take the complete stocking and fashion rugs from them or else they bleach, dye, and unravell them and then reweave the tiny thread into curtains.
