Mothers March Monday

"I want to say a personal word of thanks to all who have volunteered their services for Monday night's Mothers' March of Dimes," said Rev. Mrs. Mary Pettit, Chief Marching Mother for Milton.

"The response of the women of Milton has been gratifying. If the rest of the community shows anything like the same enthusiasm when the Mothers March to their doors, our 1961 campaign will be a resounding success."

"March of Dimes rehabilitation work is one of the finest causes I know of," said Mrs. Pettit, "and I only wish I could get across to my fellow citizens what their donations can mean to polio and accident victims as well as to those disabled from inherited causes. The activities of the Rehabilitation Foundation hold out tremendous hope to these people but their operations have to be seen to be fully appreciated."

Mrs. Pettit explained that the March of Dimes hopes to raise \$650,000 in the 1961 campaign. Mothers in 200 Ontario centres will take part in the one hour "blitz".

"In the past 12 months alone" she said "1,104 new patients were referred to the Foundation. No one has ever been turned away and the March of Dimes committee in Milton hope that no physically disabled person will ever be turned away from lack of funds."

"Our Marching Mothers are ready to go" concluded Mrs. Pettit "and we earnestly ask the people of Milton to give generously to this vital Community Service."

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RIGHT AROUND HOME

Chicken Every Sunday. Remember a few years ago, a book by this name about a typical family who did have "Chicken Every Sunday"? At one time, chicken was a real treat, one which was only served on Sundays and special occasions and usually it was roast chicken with giblet gravy and cranberry sauce.

Today chicken can be enjoyed by everyone and not just on Sunday. People are now serving chicken during the week, on special occasions, for main dishes, in salads, soups, casseroles and a variety of foreign dishes. Next to roast chicken, southern fried chicken seems to be the most popular way for serving.

Southern Fried Chicken
2½ to 3 lb. chicken
Seasoned flour
1 egg white, diluted with 2 tablespoons water
Shortening
Cut up chicken in serving pieces. Dip in seasoned flour, then in egg and water, then in the flour again. Fry them lightly, a few pieces at a time, in about one inch hot fat. Remove them and place pieces on paper towelling. When all pieces are lightly browned, place them on absorbent paper towelling in a wide, flat pan so they do not touch one another. Cook in a slow oven of 250 degrees for two hours.

This southern fried chicken can also be completely cooked in a covered skillet. To do this, brown chicken in hot fat, then reduce heat, add a little water, cover and cook until tender. Liquid may be added if necessary. When done, remove cover and fry until crisp.

Chicken is also something which is common to almost every country in the world and each one has its own way of cooking and serving this universal dish. While looking through some of the cookbooks we've acquired, there were many recipes for chicken, some from our own country and some from other parts of the world. Hawaiian Chicken is one we've never tried but have eaten on several occasions and it is delicious.

Hawaiian Chicken
1 frying chicken
1 egg, slightly beaten
Flour, salt and pepper

Melt shortening in skillet. Add celery, onions and mushrooms (if fresh are used). Stir and cook two minutes. Add chicken and mushrooms (if canned are used). Heat about 10 minutes more. Combine cornstarch, soy sauce and consomme. Stir slowly into chicken mixture. Stir and heat five minutes. Stir in almonds. Serve hot on fluffy rice.

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
