## RIGHT AROUND HOME

Chicken is a universal food which people everywhere enjoy in one form or another. Here are several recipes from various parts of the world that use chicken as their main ingredient.

The spices, fruits and vegetables are what make these dishes characteristic of the country they originally come from.

**Indian Chicken**  
2 or 3 lb. chicken, cut in serving pieces  
2 tsp. shortening  
paprika  
salt and pepper  
2 cups boiling water  
1 large onion, chopped  
¼ tsp. cloves  
¼ tsp. ginger  
¼ tsp. cinnamon  
¼ tsp. mace  
3 tsp. raisins  
¼ cup uncooked rice  
This can be made in an automatic fry pan.

Pre heat skillet at 350 deg. Melt shortening and brown chicken lightly sprinkled with paprika. Season with salt and pepper. Reduce heat to 225 deg. Add water, onion and combined spices. Cover and cook until nearly tender. Add raisins and rice. Cover and cook until rice is done and has absorbed liquid. Serve hot from skillet.

**Mexican Chicken**  
1 - 3 to 4 lb. chicken, cut up  
2 cups boiling water  
2 tsp. chili powder  
¼ tsp. pepper  
¼ tsp. cinnamon  
2 tsp. grated onion  
1 tsp. monosodium glutamate  
1 tsp. salt  
¼ cup fat  
2 cups unsweetened pineapple juice  
2 cups pineapple chunks  
2 fully ripe bananas, sliced lengthwise  
1 ripe avocado, sliced  
½ lb. white grapes

Put chicken in deep kettle, add next seven ingredients. Cover; simmer 1 hour. Remove chicken from broth. Heat fat in a skillet. Brown chicken on all sides, arrange in baking pan. Add pineapple juice to broth; heat and pour over chicken. Arrange pineapple chunks over chicken. Bake at 375 deg. for 30 minutes. Lift chicken and fruit into a serving dish; garnish with remaining fruit. Serve gravy separately.

**Chicken Chop Suey**  
2 cups cooked chicken  
2 tsp. fat  
1 small onion, cut thin  
½ green pepper, cut thin  
¼ cup mushrooms, sliced  
2 cups chicken stock  
1 tsp. soy sauce  
salt and pepper  
1 can bean sprouts  
1 tsp. cornstarch with 1 tsp. water

Cut cooked chicken in thin strips about 1 inch long. Melt butter in skillet, add onion, celery, green pepper and mushrooms. Brown slightly and add liquid. If using the remains of a roast chicken, get chicken stock

by cooking the bones from which the meat has been picked, in just enough water to cover—or use chicken soup. Allow vegetables to simmer in stock until tender about 15 to 20 minutes. Add soy sauce, season to taste with salt and pepper and stir in cornstarch. Boil 5 minutes. Add chicken and bean sprouts. Heat thoroughly but do not boil. Serve hot with boiled rice.

**Chicken Chow Mein** — Serve with fried noodles instead of rice. Also ½ cup sliced water chestnuts may be added.

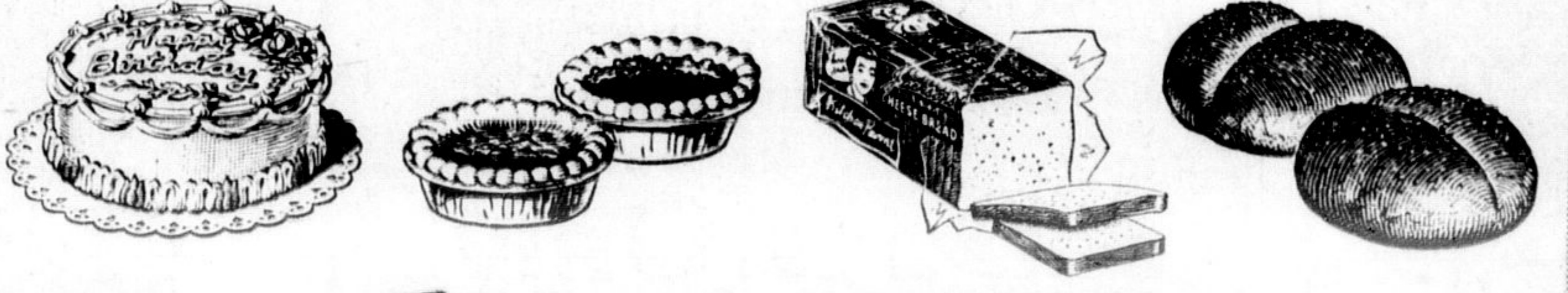

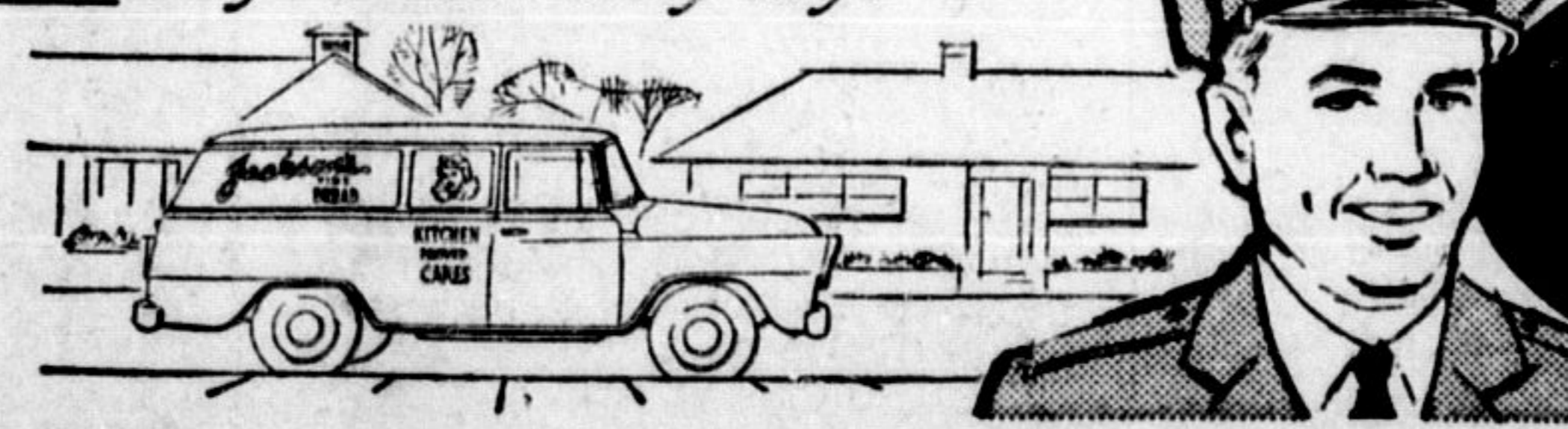
