The seven man Milton High School senior basketball team made it two straight wins when they hauled the game out of the fire with a last second basket. Milton appeared to have the game in the bag as they edged away from Georgetown after a 6-6 tie at the end of the first quarter. At the end of the half it was Milton's lead 15-12 and at the three-quarter mark it was still Milton 26-19.

In the final quarter the Georgetown quintet surged back to life using a full court press to contain their attackers while they outscored Milton 11-3. With only seconds to go they scored what looked like the winning basket. Milton took the ball and were carrying up the court when Duimstra was fouled with one second to go. The tight game caused tempers to flare at that point and Duimstra picked up a technical foul after he fanned on an opponent.

He redeemed himself by sinking both shots to give Milton the one point lead. Georgetown had a chance to tie the score but failed to bucket their single giving Milton the game. The final score was 31-30.
