### Holstein Breeders Plan Ladies' Night, Bus Tour

A banquet and ladies' night, plus a bus tour of Waterloo county, are two events that the Halton Holstein Breeders' Club are sponsoring in the near future. Plans for these events were announced by president T. H. McGee, Norval, at a directors' meeting held at the Ontario Department of Agriculture office, Milton, on Friday, March 10.

The meeting made final plans for the annual banquet and ladies' night program scheduled for March 24 at the Masonic Hall, Milton. The banquet is the most popular event sponsored by the association. This year Harold Kitching, who has been active in foreign agriculture exchange programs, will address the meeting on "Some Aspects of Agriculture in Foreign Lands."

**Futurity Class**  
One of the new programs undertaken this year is the establishment of the 1964 Halton Holstein Breeders' Club Futurity. The Futurity class, which will be featured at the 1964 Black and White Show, will have nominations up to September 1 of 1961. Breeders this year will have an opportunity of nominating heifer calves that will be eligible to exhibit as three-year-old cows in 1964. It is the first time that a Futurity class has been sponsored by Halton Holstein Breeders.

Joe Snyder, newly appointed fieldman for the Holstein-Friesian Association, addressed the meeting. The final item discussed at the directors' meeting was the annual Holstein Club bus trip. This year's trip will be a tour of Holstein herds and points of interest in Waterloo county. The trip is being planned for the first week in April.

### J. E. Whitelock to Address Meeting of Cattle Breeders

E. Harrop, president of the Central Ontario Cattle Breeding Association, has announced that J. Earl Whitelock will address the Halton county meeting of the association. Mr. Whitelock is the former agricultural representative in Halton County. His comments will include developments in agriculture and aspects of agriculture in Europe.

Halton county has been one of the most active counties in the Central Ontario Cattle Breeding Association and ranks fourth among counties using the services of the unit. During 1960, in Halton, 10,319 cattle were mated with unit bulls. This is an increase from the record high of 1959 when the figure was 9,970.

**Program Change**  
The Halton county meeting will be held in the Union Hall, Milton, at 11 a.m. on Friday, March 24. There has been a change in the program from past years and this year's program will feature reports and business sessions in the morning; lunch will be served at noon, with speakers and discussion in the afternoon.

Included in the program will be the election of Halton delegates to the annual meeting of the Central Ontario Cattle Breeding Association scheduled for Tuesday, March 28.

### Fame Sells \$17,000 Shares

"Farmers' Allied Meat Enterprises continues to grow rapidly in Halton County," provincial director Archie R. Service of Milton reported this week. He explained that to date Halton livestock producers have purchased \$17,000 of Halton's \$24,000 quota of shares in the new marketing enterprise, and more farmers are still subscribing.

Trafalgar Township went well over the top and sold \$7,100 worth of shares, while Esquesing runs a close second.

Nasagaweya continues to sell shares and Burlington's canvass is showing good results, even though only one canvasser is working.

FAME representatives hope to complete the canvass by March 31st.

### The BIBLE Today



A story, which came from the Bible depot in Santiago, Chile, states that a young Arab girl came into the depot recently asking for a Bible. Having obtained what she sought, she went along, and one of our helpers told her the girl had in some way secured a Bible against the wishes of her parents who were Muslims, had read it and had accepted Christ as her Savior. Although not permitted to attend a Christian church, she comes from time to time to buy a Bible for someone she has been able to interest in the reading of the Book.

Owing to the economic and financial difficulties in Chile, the Society's application to import scriptures was turned down six times before the authorities finally granted a permit of 60 days' duration upon payment of a tax of two per cent of the total value of the imports and a deposit with the Central Bank of Chile of a sum equivalent to 100 per cent of the imports. This means that out of 21 different bindings and sizes of the Spanish Valera version of the Bible, the depot is only able to stock 11, which are not the best sellers. But in spite of all difficulties, the work goes on.
