## Recommend Against Loaded Gun Carried on Tractor -- Inquest

The deadly combination of a loaded shotgun with no safety, a tractor and a rock resulted in the death of 42 year old Frederick Smye Sinnett on June 4. The jury at an inquest on Monday deliberated only 15 minutes before they ruled that his death was accidental as a result of a shotgun wound in his right side.

Mrs. Sinnett of R.R. 3, Milton left her husband plowing in the field at their Speyside home when she went to work at the Milton District Hospital at 3 p.m. Normally her shift would have continued until 11 p.m. that same night, but at 10 p.m., she reported she was not feeling well and was allowed to return home.

**Faint Cries**  
Turning into her driveway, the headlights of her car briefly lighted what she thought was an animal between the house and the barn. She entered the house and learned from the children that Mr. Sinnett was not there. Faint cries brought her out of the house into the driveway where she discovered her husband lying in a pool of blood.

An ambulance and Dr. Aikenhead of Milton were immediately called from a neighbor's home. Mrs. Sinnett returned home and learned from her husband that he had taken a double barreled shotgun with him on the tractor while he completed the day's plowing. He had unlocked the plow and had just started up when the tractor hit a rock throwing the gun off the tractor, butt first. When it hit the ground

the weapon discharged, fatally wounding him.

According to Mrs. Sinnett, her husband had never carried a gun on his tractor before.

**Died Enroute**  
Dr. Aikenhead arrived and attended the man until the ambulance arrived. He reported to a jury that he had arranged to take the victim to the Oakville hospital since they were better prepared to handle the severe emergency case. The doctor said that Mr. Sinnett died in the ambulance while he was with him, on the Queen Elizabeth Highway enroute to the hospital.

Constable Dave Richardson of the O.P.P. was called in to investigate the accident. He discovered the double barreled shotgun under the right wheel of the tractor, with the barrels pointing upward, the stock broken just below the breach, and one shell fired.

Checking the gun, he learned that it had no safety and the barrel was of the old damascus type. The only safe way to carry the gun, he said, was to have the breach broken.

**Guns in Vehicles**  
After delivering their verdict of accidental death, the jury recommended that loaded guns should not be carried in moving vehicles, and older guns should not be licensed.

Mr. Sinnett who was employed by the Ford Company in Oakville is survived by his wife and three children, five, three and 18 months.

It was suggested the joint meetings between the municipalities be alternated with one in Trafalgar and one in Milton, with the same arrangements to apply for deliberations with Esquering.

Councillor Pearce, chairman of the committee, was absent from the regular council meeting and no report was presented on the proposed discussions.

## Pupils Trace Underground River As Summer Conservation Project

A summer project currently being carried out by the Sixteen Mile Creek conservation authority is the tracing of a subterranean river bed in the Palermo district — a co-operative project sponsored by the Ontario Agricultural College and the Authority.

Three students and assistant field officer P. S. Waters of Hamilton are working on the project. The students are Gerry Vessels, a South African post graduate of O.A.C., Matti Nisganan, a University student on exchange from Helsinki, Finland, and Joe Martin of Milton, a Pickering college student.

The costs are being shared by the O.A.C., the Authority and the provincial government.

**Work to Milton**  
Their job is to trace this underground river through resistivity tests, and they are working to-

ward Milton hoping to link this water source with one recently discovered near the Kelso Dam north-west of Milton. This spring the river was test drilled and geologists found 25 feet of water-bearing gravel, starting 20 feet below the ground.

To date they have searched the first concession north of Highway 5, testing the river's depth and width.

Another student working with the authorities this summer is Grant Head, a third year geography student at McMaster University. He is working mainly with the 12-mile creek conservation authority, and is doing development plans on the various conservation schemes.

### Two New Schemes

Recently the 16 Mile Creek authority has adopted two new schemes. Two ponds at Campbellville are being purchased and

plans have been forwarded to the Department of Commerce and Development for approval. At the request of the Township of Trafalgar, the authority has adopted the acquisition and repair of flood plain lands south of Highway 5 as a project.

Members of the Halton 4H Forestry Club, which is sponsored by the 16-Mile Creek Conservation Authority, were recently taken on a bus trip to a Thorold paper company and to Niagara Falls. The trip completed the members' project.

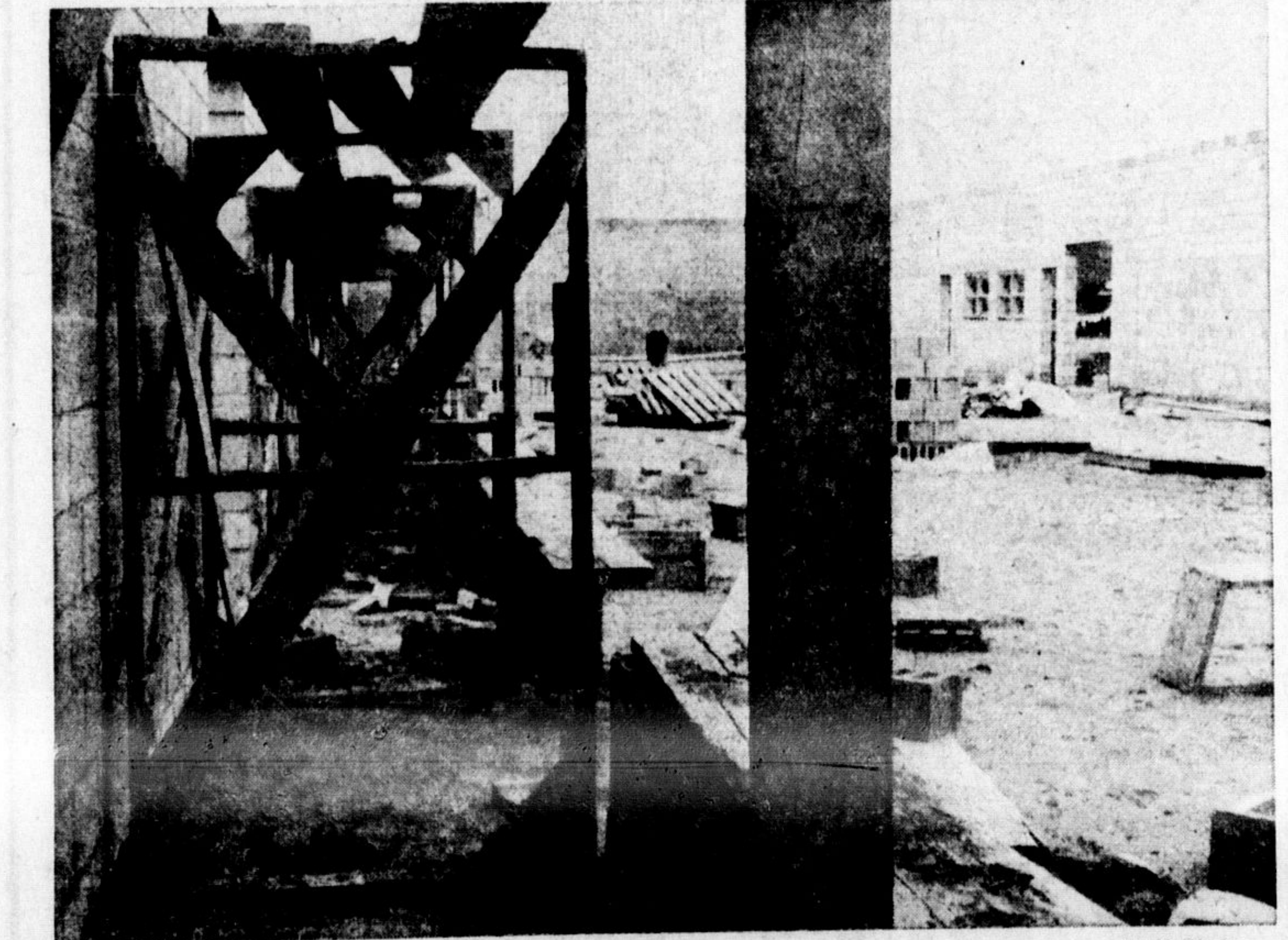

## TIRE INFLATION

Aside from faulty alignment, nothing will wear the tread off your tires as quickly as underinflation. Yet service records show that nine out of ten motorists keep less pressure in their tires than they need.



Here are some figures to illustrate the cost of underinflated tires: total tire life is reduced 5 percent if tires are kept only 10 percent underinflated; tire life decreases 16 percent at 20 percent underinflation; at 30 percent underinflation a tire will last only two-thirds of normal. At 50 percent of normal inflation, tire life would drop to 22 percent.

Overinflation up to 15 percent is permissible and is even advocated by some authorities for better than normal tire wear, though this of course makes for a "harder" ride and tends to produce body looseness. A sensible general rule seems to be to keep your tires slightly higher than standard recommendations for better wear, or at the recommended figure if maximum softness of ride is desired.

When buying new tires, try inflating them to double normal pressure, then deflate to desired road pressure. Keep to 40 mph for the first 100 miles. This flexing of the rubber without heat will considerably lengthen tire life.

Incidentally, it is usually useless to balance new tires until they've had a chance to "settle" themselves over several hundred miles. It is best to buy new tires in matched sets. We will be glad to give you a liberal allowance for unused tread.
