Cain is Master Over Red Sox Hilson Charged With 7-2 Loss

The Acton Tanners' ace right hander H. Cain continued his mastery over the Milton Red Sox with a well pitched six hit victory Thursday night at Milton's agricultural park.

Cain picked up his second win over the Sox in as many games. He scattered six hits over seven innings, gave up three walks and had two strikeout victims in the 7-2 win.

Wayne Hilson, making his first start for Milton, showed the effects of the long layoff and gave up seven hits, six walks and recorded two strikeouts. He received no support from his teammates, except Ron Shannon, who came up with two sparkling plays at second base.

Plenty of Errors

Left fielder Stu Hannant dropped two easy fly balls and right fielder Jack Charlton also came up with a miscue. Catcher Doug Hyatt also got into the act as he "dozed" at the plate on a throw from right field in the third inning. This was the winner's big inning as they scored three runs on three hits.

Glen Dance and Ron Shannon combined for a pretty twin killing in the sixth inning to get Pison out of trouble. Paul Lawson and "Red" Anderson led the winners' seven hit attack on Hilson with

a pair of singles each. Acton left fielder "Scotty" McCristall pulled down several hard drives in a fine defensive display. Cain received air tight support from his infield to make his win a lot easier.

Barrett in Shape

One of the bright spots in the Milton outfield was the work of newcomer Tom Barrett. With the bases loaded in the top of the seventh and one out, Barrett hauled in a high fly ball and threw a strike to the catcher Doug Hyatt to erase B. McCristall and end the inning.

Al Wingrove led the all-star attack with a double and two singles. Stu Hannant and Bob Bruce both singled and doubled. Earl Cairns homered and Len Coolich, Stan Henderson, Pete Kennedy, Jack Laking and Garry Field all singled.

Footnotes: The all-star pitching plans had to be radically altered as they had only three hurlers. Lyn McLaren of Georgetown had to rush his wife to the hospital and Roger Jacobs of Oakville failed to show up. Doug Hyatt of Milton (working) and Mario Sebben and Jim Wilson (sick) of Dundas also weren't on hand.

Defensively, Bob Bruce, Len Coolich and Al Wingrove stood out. Following the game, an informal garden party was held in Campbellville.
