Restricted Area By-law 1961-80 Purpose of the By-law

To take out of the provisions of the Zoning By-law the regulations with regard to fencing in Industrial Zones.

Effect of the By-law
This will have no effect other than eliminating the regulations from the Zoning By-law. Control to be implemented under Section 379 of The Municipal Act.

Location of the Lands Affected
All the lands in the Northern Planning Area of Trafalgar Township, which Planning Area consists of all the lands north of the First Concession Road north of the Dundas Highway.

A By-law to amend By-law 1958-48 Re Fences

1. Section 7 A. (11) of By-law 1958-48 is repealed.

2. This By-law comes into force when approved by The Ontario Municipal Board.

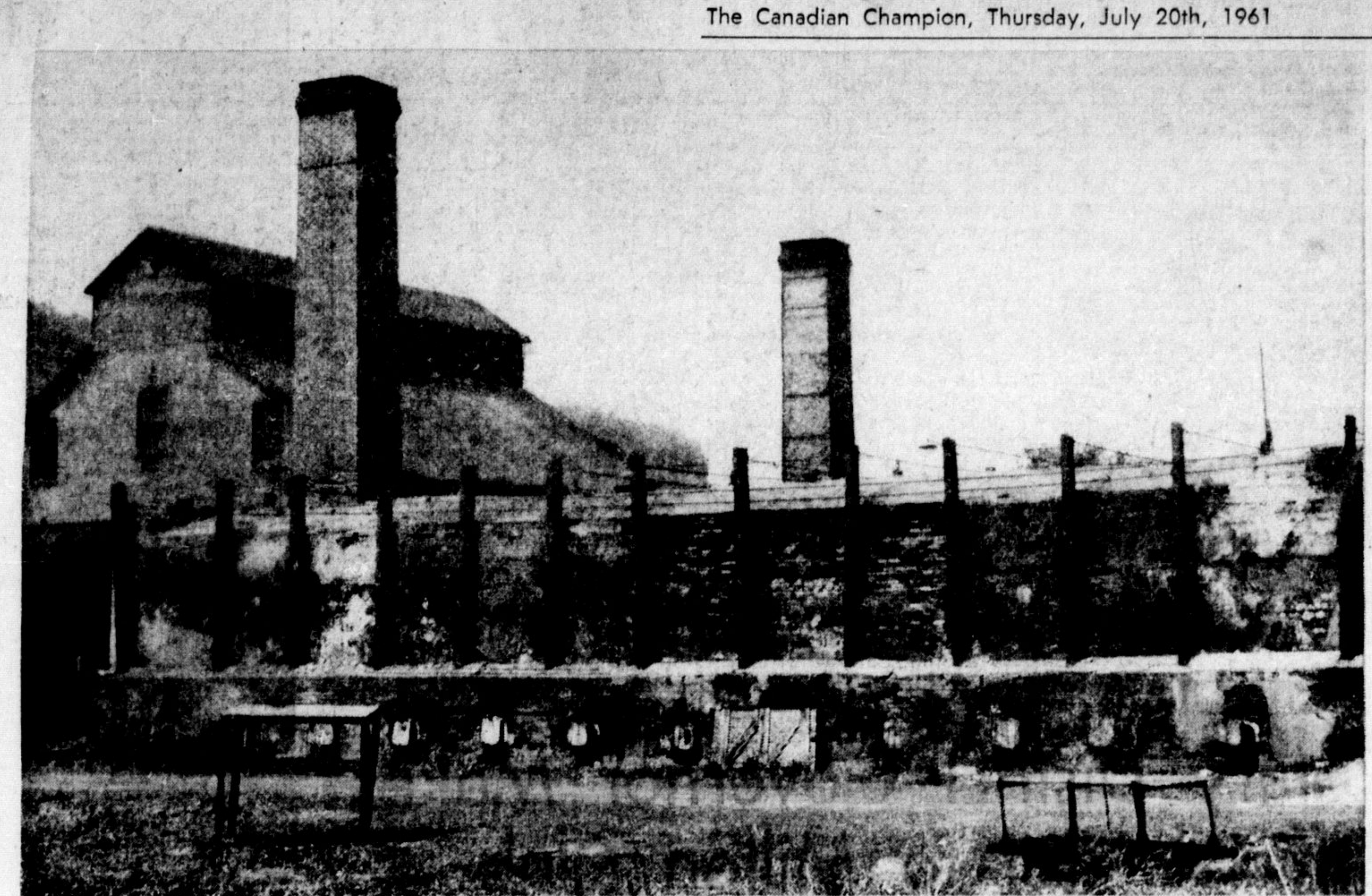
