## RIGHT AROUND HOME

Though, everybody talks about the weather, nobody, as Mark Twain pointed out, has ever been able to change it.

Even on the hottest summer days you can beat the weather-man at his own game with smart menu planning. A cool salad dinner, crisp garnishes and an iced refreshing beverage will do the trick.

Gelatin salads can be made when it is cool in the morning and left ready to garnish for the evening meal.

**SUMMER SALMON**  
2 tablespoons plain gelatin  
One-third cup cold water

1 can (1 pound) salmon, drained and flaked  
1 medium cucumber, peeled and finely chopped  
1 cup finely chopped celery  
1 1/2 cups sour cream  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
2 teaspoons horseradish  
2 tablespoons minced onion  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Soften gelatin in the water. Stir over hot water until gelatin is dissolved. In a large mixing bowl, mix together the gelatin, salmon, cucumber, and celery. Combine sour cream, lemon juice, horseradish, onion, salt

and pepper and add to the vegetable mixture. Mix lightly but well. Spoon into a 1 1/2 qt. mold and chill until set. Unmold on lettuce leaves and garnish with cucumber slices.

And for a cool drink try this Mint Cup.  
4 sprigs of mint  
2 cups water  
2 cups sugar  
2 cups lemon juice  
1/4 tsp. salt

a little green coloring  
1 quart ginger ale  
Remove the tips and leaves from the mint and add to the sugar and water. Boil these ingredients for 5 minutes.

Strain the syrup and add the lemon juice, salt and food coloring, chill well. Immediately before serving add chilled ginger ale. Makes two quarts.

Do you have trouble getting gelatin salads out of molds? Try this hint. Brush the mold lightly with salad oil before putting the salad to set. When the salad is firm, it will slip out easily with only a gentle shake.

Cucumbers, split or sliced and soaked in beet juice, may be used to garnish salads. Let the cucumbers stand in beet juice for 30 minutes; chill. The cucumber "meat" turns pink but the seeds remain green.

Stuff hollowed out tomatoes with cheddar cheese, crisp bacon pieces and some of the tomato pulp. Top with bacon and cheese and pop into broiler. It makes a delicious summer tomato treat.

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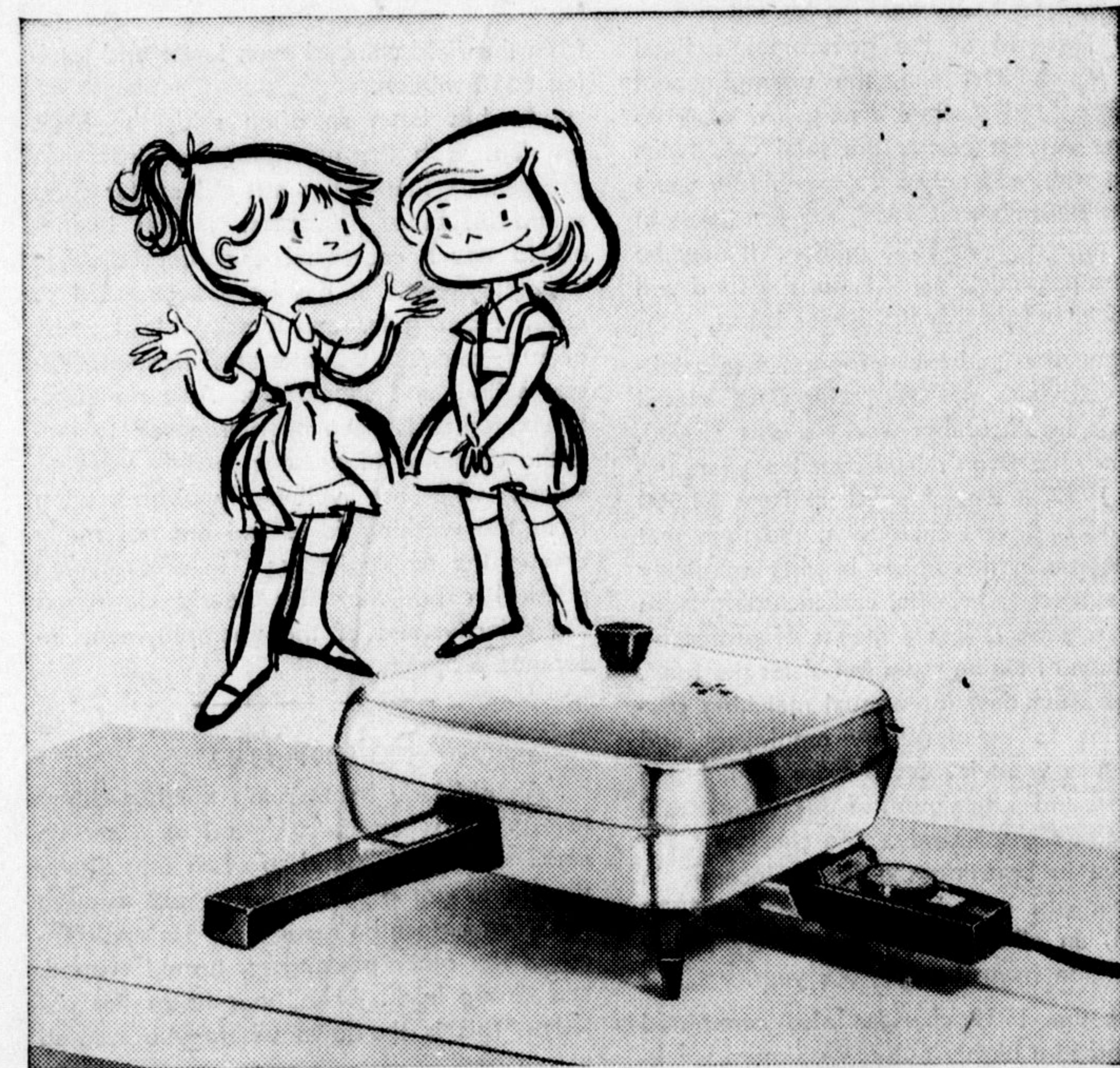
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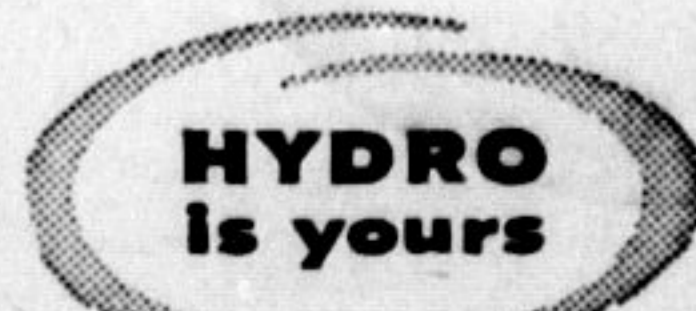
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
