The driver Osear Vankeirsbilck, 27. and Bruno Marziana, 31, received abbrasions and lacerations. According to Constable Joseph Feldcamp of North Halton O.P.P., the truck was about a mile west of Milton on Highway 401 when a rear tire blew and the truck swerved and toppled over. All three men were thrown out. The truck received \$1,500 damage.


