Ghanan Visitors From Pen Pal Friendship

From little acorns, large oaks grow and a former Milton resident this month found out that a little seed of friendship well planted and regularly cultivated can reap a big crop of results.

This week former Miltonian J. H. "Herb" Marshall, now a resident of Hamilton, will receive a "formal visit" from the Ghana Government's high commissioner to Canada, his wife and youngest daughter.

18 Month Friendship
It all started about 18 months ago when Mr. Marshall, seeking out foreign correspondents in many far-away countries, wrote a letter to a lady named Nylander in Ghana. She turned out to be a talented lady, a juvenile magistrate, National Treasurer of the Y.W.C.A., who served on the probation committee and was chairman of a day nursery society.

Needless to say a warm friendship-by-letter resulted and they carried on their correspondence for some time.

At that time her husband was Minister of State and responsible for defence works, along with Ghana's Prime Minister. Early this spring he was appointed as high commissioner to Canada and came to our country for a short time. Later he brought his wife and daughter to Ottawa, leaving behind four daughters and a son.

Now that his "pen pal" was so close, Mr. Marshall wrote inviting the family to visit Hamilton, and recently he received an official reply from the commissioner's office saying they would be there from July 28 to July 31.

Mrs. Nylander seemed to sum things up in one of her recent letters. "Indeed God's ways are mysterious, and it is really amazing to think that very soon we shall meet personally," she wrote to her Hamilton friend.
