actually not a stone at all, but the "door" of a spiral, Turban shell . . . which this tiny sea creature uses to seal himself in! And the world's most beautiful cameos are cut from Helmet shells. Shells are used in huge quantities by the manufacturers of porcelain. Giant Clam shells have been found to grow three feet long, and weight as much as 500 lbs; and they have been put to use as church baptismal fonts, and even garden fish ponds!

The mighty ocean, we soon discover, is very delicate and perfect in the details. Shells hold a permanent reminder of the natural beauty and perfection of

nature. The petals fall from the rose, the clouds drift on, the birds fly south . . . but shells remain . . . a constant reminder of the beauty and wonder of God's world, and indeed, of all creation.

Do you still have a shore-line holiday ahead? Plan to join the beach-combers! What could remind one more of summer fun? The very beach and the sky, and the magnificent roll of the waves are all incorporated into the curves and the colors, the curls and the flaring designs of shells. There is a very old proverb which inquires of us:

"If thou hast gathered nothing in thy youth, how canst thou find anything in thine age?"

RIGHT AROUND HOME

During the summer when outdoor parties and picnics are a must, sandwiches are the thing to serve and for those special picnic occasions what could be more beautiful, yet more practical and easy to serve, than a ribbon sandwich loaf! It's a delightful combination of flavours, with ham, tomato slices and tuna-cheese filling between fresh slices of enriched white sandwich bread. The fluffy cream cheese frosting and the dainty pimento heart garnish make the finished loaf a welcome centerpiece on my bridal table.

Directions
Here are complete directions for making the sandwich loaf:

Ingredients

one 2 pound unsliced sandwich loaf
6 tablespoons soft butter
6 slices cooked ham
1 1/2 cups tun-cheese filling (recipe below)
6 or 8 large firm tomato slices, 1/4" thick

Remove top, side and end crusts from sandwich loaf. Slice lengthwise into 4 even slices. Spread butter on inside of top and bottom slices, and on both sides of the two inside slices. Arrange ham slices so they cover the bottom slice. Top with second slice, and spread this with tuna-cheese filling. Add third bread layer, and arrange firm tomato slices to cover the bread.

Top with the fourth bread slice, pressing all firmly together. Wrap loaf in waxed paper or transparent film, and refrigerate until chilled. Then, spread cream cheese frosting over top and sides of the loaf. Sprinkle sides of loaf with chopped almonds. Garnish top with sprigs of parsley or

watercress, and a good-sized heart, cut from pimento or cranberry jelly. Refrigerate until serving time. When ready to serve, slice with a smooth, sharp knife, into 12 servings. Serve on a lettuce or watercress garnish, with a fork. Yield: 12 servings.

Tuna-cheese Sandwich Filling

Combine:
1/3 cup grated processed cheese
one hard cooked egg, chopped finely
1/2 cup canned tuna (or salmon), flaked
one tablespoon chopped green pepper
one tablespoon chopped onion
one tablespoon chopped stuffed olives

3 tablespoons mayonnaise
salt and celery salt to taste
Makes: 1 1/2 cups
Fluffy Cream Cheese Frosting
Combine:
one 8 ounce package white cream cheese
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 cup milk

Beat until light and fluffy, and spread before chilling. Use approximately 1/2 cup toasted, chopped almonds for garnish for sides. Cut red heart from pimento or chilled cranberry jelly for top garnish.

Here is a recipe for another sandwich loaf which is delicious and a little different in that it is toasted and served hot with a mushroom sauce.

Mushroom Sandwich Loaf
Prepare the loaf of sandwich bread the same as above. Spread the bottom slice with a prepared cheese spread the next slice with a salmon or tuna mixture and the next slice with an egg salad mixture top with the last slice. Spread soft butter on the en-

tire loaf and bake at 350 degree for 20 minutes. Remove from the oven slice and serve with a hot mushroom sauce made with a can of condensed mushroom soup mixed with 1/2 cup milk.
