## Sunshine School Plans Progress Group May Call Tenders Soon

Plans for the construction of a new school for retarded children of North Halton are still proceeding, according to a report this week from Gerry Addison of Milton, chairman of the North Halton Association for Retarded Children's building committee.

He reported the architect is working on detail plans for the schoolhouse, which is to be erected on the Seventh Line north of Hornby. Approval of the plans has been received from the Fire Marshal's Office, and authorities are awaiting the okay of the Department of Health.

Once this approval is received the organization will be able to call tenders. However it is not known whether or not the school can be built this year. Milton's campaign along with the district campaign by the Women's Institutes has realized \$11,000 and this, along with money raised last year, brings the total to around \$15,000. But to date no results of fund raising campaigns in either Georgetown or Acton have been received.

Mr. Addison said it depends on how much these municipalities

have raised, whether the school can be built this fall or held over until next year. Total cost of the proposed school is \$40,000.
