In the junior section under 10 years of age, the winners were Wendy Kress with 14 points; making four first and one second; Judy Saunders with seven points, making one first and two seconds; Ada and Esther Malstrom with three points, making one first prize on Zinnias grown from seed supplied by the Horticultural Society.

 The judges for the flower show were Mrs. G. Condon, Islington and Mrs. J. Heslop, Toronto. Mrs. Frank Chisholm president called the meeting to order in the evening and introduced Mrs. G. W. Condon who works with junior children in horticultural work. Mrs. Condon showed some of her many fine pictures; some from Timmins Flower Show, and other interesting

scenes in that locality. Other slides were from the Royal Botanical Gardens at Hamilton, showing the various prize entries at their famous Christmas show. Other beautiful slides in colored egg craft work done by children were much enjoyed, and a new feature to many.

After this treat in pictures, Mrs. J. Heslop carried out "Flower Arrangements", using her own home grown flowers and foliage, and placed them in her own artistic and interesting containers. Her arrangements were easily and quickly completed in her deft hands, as she graciously showed and explained her work.

Offers Property For C.P.R. Walk

Milton Council agreed Monday to have the streets committee with the mayor view an eight foot piece of property offered the town by the Smith estate to complete the pedestrian walk across the C.P.R. tracks at Court St.

In a letter to council W. A. Jones, president of Milton Bus and Body Co. Ltd. and holders of the lease on the property, offered to sell an eight foot strip to the town for \$200, rather than the larger block proposed by the town.

Mr. Jones noted a pedestrian walk over the C.P.R. would be eight feet wide. "In view of this and in the interest of saving the town money, besides from the safety angle to our citizens, Mr. Smith has asked me to act for him in offering to the town of Milton, the eight foot strip in line with the C.P.R. plan for \$200."

Members reviewed plans of the pedestrian crossing proposed by the C.P.R. and finally agreed to referring the matter to the committee for a report and recommendation at the next meeting.

Fields as visitors flocked to the site, some to catch their first glimpse of the out-dated machines and others to refresh their memories of the operation. Cameras clicked furiously as fans captured pictures of the antique equipment at work and children were treated to rides on some of the engines.

 Competition was keen as drivers jockeyed for position in the races and contests. Nearly every visitor watched the miniature steam engines, built to scale as they were being operated by their owners.

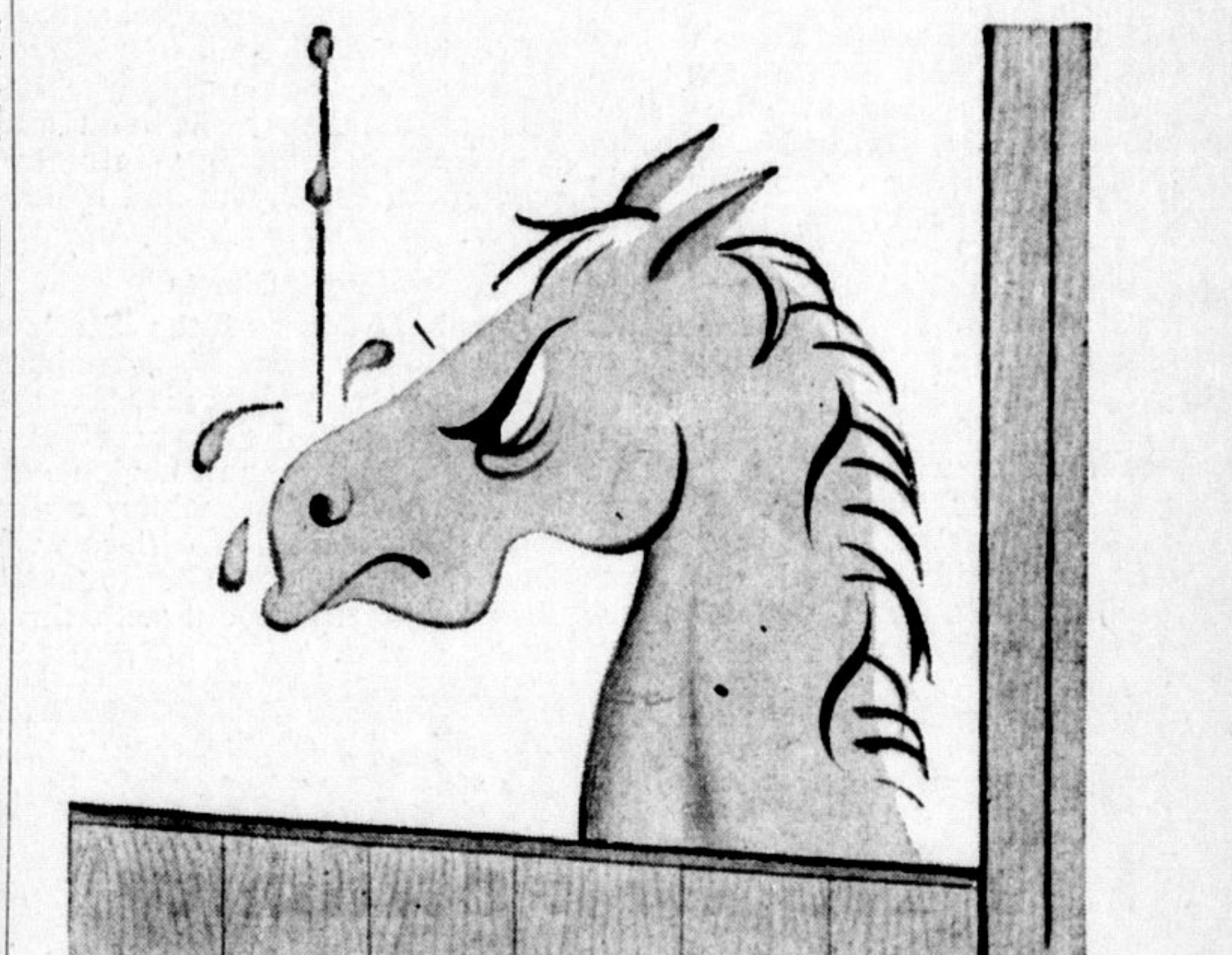

Town Council Briefs

Council on Monday:
 ● Approved payment of \$1,606.80 to the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority as the balance of their grant for 1961.

● Approved transfer of \$20,000 to the Milton Public School Board to meet their obligations.

● Filed advice of a Committee of Adjustment hearing for W. H. Makin on Mountain View Dr. for relief of the side lot line restrictions to permit a carport.

● Approved installation of an asphalt sidewalk on Thomas St. from Sarah to Sydney St. with the old cement sidewalk to be removed.

● Declined to remove stumps from Main St. property after having removed the trees. It was pointed out the town did not customarily remove stumps.

● Amended the dog by-law giving it three readings. The only change was in the preamble citing the provincial authority under which the by-law is passed.

● Referred a suggested agreement with the School for the Deal covering provision of services, to the solicitor for study.

● Referred to the water committee and town foreman the matter of supplying water to a warehouse being built on the base line.

● Approved payment of the following accounts; police \$930.07, properties and contingencies \$1,106.96, welfare \$143.75, water-works \$2,234.94, sewers and sanitation \$892.55, streets and walks \$4,700.58, capital \$2,300, finance \$1,722.15.

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
