Setting Stage for Fair 109th Promises Big Event

Halton Agricultural Society's 1961 version of the Milton Fall Fair is shaping up to be a great one. It will be the 109th annual fair to be held in Milton fair grounds, and the dates are September 29 and 30.

President Wilfred Crozier and his committees and directors have succeeded in already lining up a sparkling program for the two day event. It starts Thursday night and Friday morning, September 28 and 29, when exhibitors flock to the halls to set up entries and commercial displays. Friday afternoon the 4-H Clubs of the county meet in front of the grandstand for their annual calf and swine shows.

Saturday Show
Saturday morning the various cattle shows start in the show

rings and through the day there will be sheep, swine, goat, poultry and cattle competitions. It promises to be the biggest show of livestock for miles around.

In the afternoon the horse classes will compete in front of the grandstand, where Vince Mountford will emcee the program. Official opening will be one by Halton M.P. Stanley Hall at 2 p.m. in front of the grandstand, and then three harness races will be held, with a total purse of \$700. Farm implements will be displayed by various local dealers, a midway will be set up on the grounds, and a baby show will be conducted in the commercial building.

Four Halton County Exhibitors Win C.N.E. Holstein Prizes

The Holstein Show at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, on August 24 and 25 was one of the largest on record as 333 head were paraded before Judge A. M. Barr of Kempenville. These were shown by 110 exhibitors, largely from the 11 counties of West-Central Ontario,

for which the C.N.E. is designated as the Championship Show.

Last year Waterloo nosed out Peel in the county herd class after the latter had won for 22 consecutive years. This year the placing was again extremely close, with Waterloo on top, Peel second and York third. The two top herds were so well balanced that they beat out York, though the latter herd contained both the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion cows and the Grand Champion bull. Brant, Halton, Wellington, Welland, Wentworth, Grey, Lincoln and Haldimand followed in that order.

Four Halton County exhibitors placed in the winnings in various classes. Tovell Bros., Palermo had third place in the senior yearling bull class, while Ralph I. Ford of Milton had third in the class for cows three years and under four, not in milk. T. H. McGee of Norval took third for three year old heifers in milk, and the Campbellville farm of George and L. H. Leaver won second in the junior yearling heifer competition.

Approve Grant On Flood Land

Stanley L. Hall, M.P.P. for Halton, announced today that the Hon. W. M. Nickle, Minister of Commerce and Development, has informed him that the Ontario Government approved a \$7,250 grant to the Twelve Mile Creek Conservation Authority.

The grant will enable the Authority to acquire 44 acres of flood plain land in the Township of East Flamborough in the County of Wentworth. Once acquired, the Authority will move to prevent the construction of any building on this land which is subject to annual flooding; and will prevent dumping of stream restricting fill in the area. The Authority will carry out effective conservation measures by constructing a water storage pond, creating channel improvements and undertaking a reforestation programme.

The Provincial grant represents 50 per cent of costs involved.

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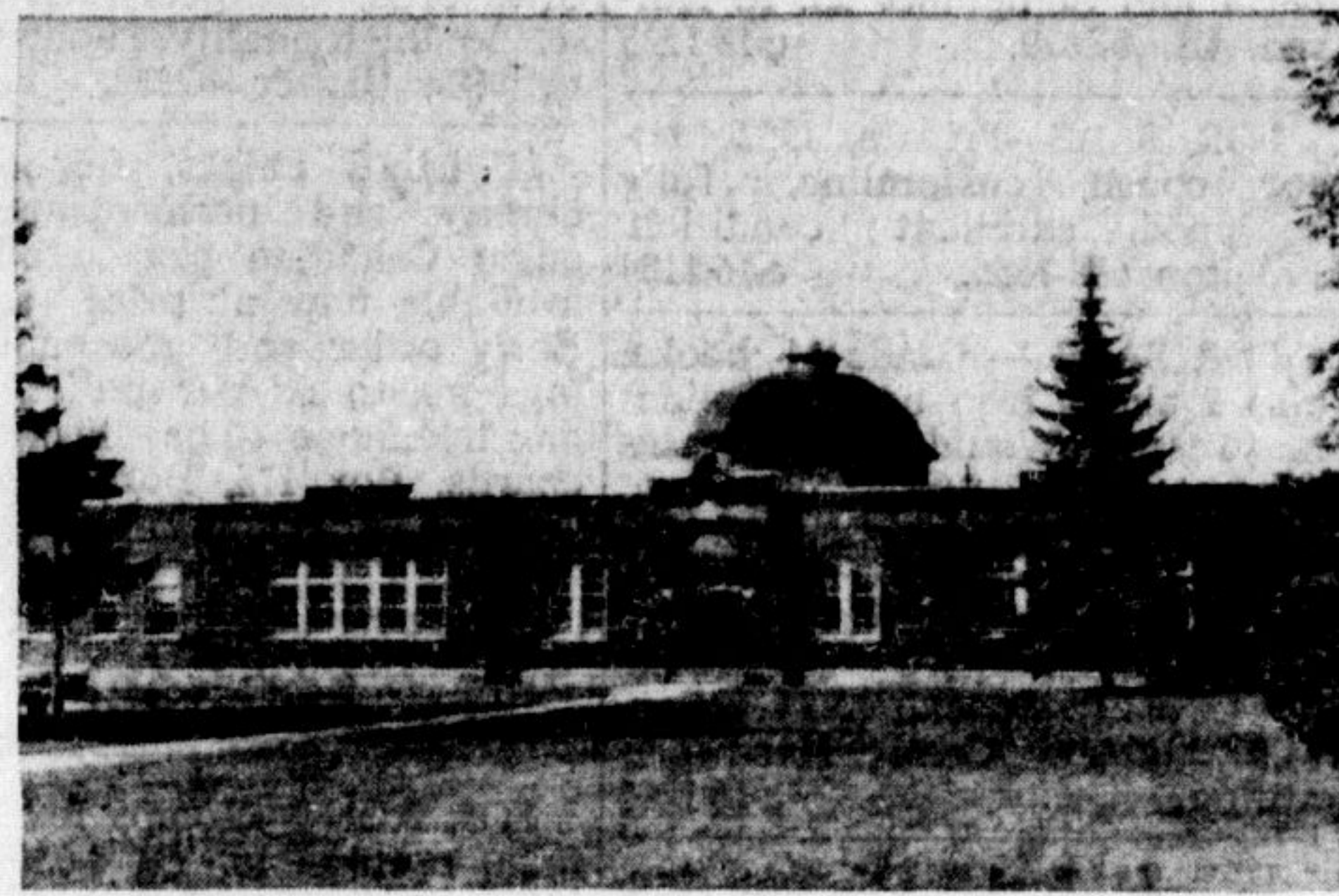

COURSES AVAILABLE

GRADE 9 — The Grade 9 student must take English, History, Geography, Health and Physical Education, Mathematics, Science, Guidance.

In addition the student must choose any two or three of the following optional subjects: Shop or Agriculture (boys), Home Economics (girls), French, Music or Business Practice.

GRADE 10 — The student must take English, History, Geography, Health and Physical Education, Science. In addition, the student must choose any three or four for the following optional subjects: Mathematics, French, Shop and Home Economics, Latin or Typing.

GRADE 11 — A student in Grade 11 must take three compulsory subjects: English, History and Health and Physical Education; plus at least four subjects from

the following options: French, Latin, Physics (Agricultural Science Part 1), Geometry, Geography, Commercial (Typing).

GRADE 12 — A student in Grade 12 must take three compulsory subjects: English, History, Health and Physical Education plus at least four subjects from the following options: French, Latin, Chemistry (Agricultural Science Part 2), Algebra, Commercial (Book-keeping), Geography.

GRADE 13 — In 1961-62 at Milton District High School, the following subjects or combinations of subjects will be offered in Grade 13: English Composition and Literature, Geometry or Latin, Algebra or Geography, Trigonometry or History, French, Chemistry, Physics or Biology (Botany and Zoology.)

BUS ROUTES

BUS ROUTE 1

Operated by George Inglis

This route will be the same as last year as far as Campbellville. It will end there and return to Milton.

BUS ROUTE 2

Operated by Morris Poole

This route will be the same as last year but will not include Milton Heights or Peru.

BUS ROUTE 3

This is a new route this year and will take the following route.
