

## Predict Record-Breaking Event

This year's showcase of agriculture is out to smash last year's record-breaking Milton Fall Fair. Officials of the Halton Agricultural Society are pleased with the constant rushing river of entries pouring onto their desks at the agricultural grounds this week. A few details are all that have to be straightened out as show-time opens Friday. Everything is under control, according to society president Will Crozier.

### Midway Thrills

Children will thrill to the midway rides, and whether you are a farmer, merchant, businessman or housewife, there is interest for you. The show will be much the same as last year, except that a new firm is supplying the midway rides and with two other notable exceptions.

After an absence of several years, one of the most popular events in fairs of the past, the Baby Show will return. For the past few years, the show has lacked a sponsor, but this year Campbell's Department Store decided to back it. A brand new feature is the arrival of a helicopter, which will provide panoramic views of the fair and of Milton to any daring enough to risk taking a ride.

Arts and crafts and flowers will fill the hall under the grandstand along with displays of fruits and vegetables. Closer to the entrances will be the private showcase of individual exhibitors.

Women's Institutes will dominate the No. 1 building with work by Milton's children showing baking, sewing, and other samples of home economics. Building No.

2 will house the commercial exhibits and No. 3 building will be devoted to the Junior Farmers.

### Official Opening

Stan Hall, M.P.P. for Halton, will officially open the fair at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The halls and midway will be open Friday night.

Prizes and more prizes will be given out to winners of the livestock competitions. Another exclusive for the fair and for all of Halton is the goat contest.

The sport of kings will have competing trotters, pacers and drivers from all over Ontario. Although there will be no wagering facilities, the trials of speed will be one of the highlights. Beef and dairy cattle, sheep and swine will be fenced off.

The ladies will watch the judg-

ing of the jam and jelly contest intently, hoping for a win to put them in a highly honored position among the housewives. The fair sex will probably leave their husbands standing to see the display put on by Halton women's institutes.

Gardeners will flock to see the flowers and plants exhibits while those with the creative touch will gaze admiringly at oils, pastels, water colors and toned pictures in the arts and crafts display.

### Photo Display

The amateur shutterbugs will cast an eye on the photographic display in the same exhibit along with the backyard craftsman who will be looking at metal work, leathercraft, homemade jewelry, woodcraft, pottery and several other varieties of artistic home-craft. Parents can marvel at their children's displays of penmanship, art, school projects, sewing, industrial arts, collections and agricultural exhibits.

Horse show classes will be held on the ball diamond in front of the grandstand. The cattle rings will be busy all day Saturday with judging of several classes taking place at one time.

All in all, it promises to be the best fair yet, with a little something in store for everyone who attends.

# Welfare Minister Praises Manor...

It was agreed that rather than enlarge the home at Brampton, a new one should be built.

"In April, 1949, Halton County Council appointed a committee to formulate a plan for construction of a home in Halton. In July, the committee presented their report to the council, recommending that construction be commenced as soon as possible. In September, 20 acres of land were purchased for \$6,000. On October 26, 1950, County Council accepted the tender of James Kemp Construction Company for \$530,000, for construction of a 95-bed home. July 10, 1952, Halton Centennial Manor was officially opened and about 35 residents were transferred from Brampton to their new home.

"It was the opinion of county officials and the Department of Welfare that this 95-bed home providing normal care, bed care and special care accommodation would suffice for many years to come. Due to the great increase in population and the acceptance by senior citizens of Halton Centennial Manor as a home, rather than an institution, it became necessary in 1955 to provide extra beds.

"It was decided to build a Staff Residence separate from the main building and thus free 12 more beds for the use of residents. In April, 1956, construction was started on a Staff residence costing \$98,500. It was officially opened by Mr. L. E. Ludlow, November 4, 1956.

### More Accommodation

"Early in 1958, it was again apparent that further accommodation must be provided. It was decided by the Board, County Council and the Department of Welfare, Homes for the Aged Branch, the addition should be as large as the existing services would permit and that this would be the ultimate size of the home. The plans, therefore, called for an increase from 105 to 235 beds. The wisdom of the original committee in purchasing such a large piece of land in such an ideal location was now appreciated.

"While planning the additions to the home, all parties concerned were cognizant of the fact that many of the residents would not be able to participate in the life of the community. Additions to Halton Centennial Manor, therefore, provide as well as large, bright, bed, sitting and dining rooms, such features as

a beautiful chapel, an auditorium, a library, a tuck shop, barber shop, beauty parlor and craft shops. The interest and generosity of the churches, service clubs, fraternal organizations and others in providing services and entertainment keep these facilities in constant use.

"The landscaping of the grounds is progressing and when completed, will make the Manor one of the showplaces of the county and one of which all citizens may well be proud. County Council, the Board of Management and the residents of Halton Centennial Manor wish to acknowledge with sincere thanks the many gifts and donations by churches, service clubs, fraternal organizations and individuals. Their contributions have added greatly to the comfort and enjoyment of the residents."

### Board Members

This year the Manor Board is comprised of chairman Douglas Sargent, Reeve of Georgetown; Reeve Alex Phillips, Warden of Halton County; Reeve Campbell Sinclair, of Esqueving; Reeve John Milne of Nassagaweya, and Reeve Fred C. Tilley of Oakville. Stanley A. Allen is superintendent of the Manor and Garfield

Brown, County Clerk, is secretary of the board.

Following the weekend opening house, the superintendent reported he received many favorable comments on the building from guests who toured the home and from superintendents of other homes for the aged who visited from district centres. Visitors from outside the county who attended and registered in the guest book included people from Bradford, Waterloo, Hamilton, Snelgrove, Newmarket, Ingersoll, Toronto, Brampton, Guelph, Clinton, Preston and Picton. There were even guests from the Province of Quebec and one from England.

Mr. Allen announced that anyone who might have missed the open house is still welcome to see the new facilities. Groups or individuals are invited to see the Manor anytime during visitors' hours, 2 to 4 p.m. (Sundays 2.30 to 4 p.m.) or any evening 7 to 8 p.m.
