Pee Wees into O.B.A. Final Meet Essex Here on Sunday

Milton Pee Wees advanced to the O.B.A. finals for the second consecutive year by ousting Gananogue in two straight games. The second game of the series was played in Gananogue on Saturday, and the locals edged the Eastern Ontario boys 6-4 on the strength of a four-run rally in the fifth innings.

Milton scored the first run of the game in the second, when Craig Brush walked and Clement tripled to score the run. Gananogue promptly came back with two runs off a walk and two hits, and added another in the fourth off one hit to take the lead 3-1. In the first of the fifth, with two out and two on base, Bob Hetherington hit to the pitcher who threw wild over the first baseman's head to score Houston, and put Doug Naylor and Hetherington on second and third. Brush then clouted a ground rule double which would have gone for a home run in another park, and then scored on Clement's single, to make the score 5-3 for Milton.

Spills Homer
Gananogue again threatened in the sixth, when Shine singled and Hohmeier tripled to score one run. Fast action by Garry Mountain in left field held Hohmeier to a triple when Garry fielded the ball and made a long throw to the infield to spoil a home run. In the seventh, Brush again walked and the run scored on a fielder's choice for Clement and a single for Hearn.

The first man up for Gananogue grounded out to the pitcher, Lloyd doubled and Carron struck out to bring the tying run to the plate with two out. Walker then hit a screaming line drive to left field, and Garry Mountain became the hero of the game when he ran a mile to snare the ball with one hand from an impossible angle to retire the side and end the game.

Robert Lee pitched the first four innings for Milton, and was relieved by Brush. Dailey and Burns shared the pitching duties for Gananogue. Gananogue out-hit Milton 6-5, getting three hits off each Milton pitcher. Cle-

ment was top hitter for Milton with a triple and two singles in four trips to the plate, also having a fielder's choice, and Brush and Hearn accounted for the other two hits.

Following the game, the Canadian Legion played host to both teams, treating them to hot dogs and pop.

Milton now must travel to the other end of the province to meet Essex for the O.B.A. Pee Wee "B" Championship. The first game of the best of three series will be played in Milton on Sunday, October 1, at 1 p.m. at the Steel Plant diamond.

You're a smart shopper, but did you know the gasoline you bought at your local station yesterday isn't the same as the gasoline you bought there last winter? And gasoline you buy in the mountains this summer will be different from the same brand at lower altitudes.

Gasoline is tailor-made for seasons and areas. Gasoline works well only when it's properly vaporized. And vaporization varies with weather and geographical conditions.

So... oil men divide the year into three seasons — summer, winter and spring-fall — and the country into weather sections. For each they prescribe, on a monthly basis, the fuel with the best rate of vaporization — faster in cold areas and in winter, slower in warm areas and in summer.

In some areas, chemicals are put into gasoline to eliminate carburetor icing.

Council Briefs

Support Homemaker's Service

Support at the county level for a Homemaker's Service, was approved by Milton Council Monday. The Halton Community Welfare Council asked if council would be prepared to support such a program at the local municipal level or at the county level.

Reeve Mary Pettit, chairman of the welfare committee, suggested she could not see the advantage of setting up a Homemaker Service in town. "I feel we couldn't do it here now but we could work with the county group", she concluded.

The letter from the Welfare Council explained the service was to assist where there was sickness in the family or a patient confined to bed.

It was pointed out the province pays half the cost of the service, not to exceed \$8 per day, and it could be operated by the municipality or by an organization on behalf of the municipality.

Ratify Agreement

Council requested the Halton County Health Unit to carry out the plumbing inspections in the town. The Unit advised council the present arrangement provided for a month's notice by either party to terminate the present basis of inspection. The Ontario Water Resources Commission had advised the unit this would not be possible. The Unit had agreed to continue the inspections providing the municipalities were agreeable.

Deputy-Reeve John Charlton reported an inquiry from county authorities on the possibility of the town continuing the sewer and water line on the base line to the east town limits to ser-

vice the new county building. The deputy-reeve asked that the clerk advise the county they could connect to the town services where they are presently located since the town did not anticipate extending the line. Estimated costs of the service extension would be \$15,000.

Receive Endorsement

Prime Minister Diefenbaker's office acknowledged receipt of the council's endorsement of a plan for national sweepstakes. A letter from the Minister of Justice acknowledged the letter had been referred to him.

Council agreed to accept a deed to one foot of land along the frontage of a Martin St. lot south of the C.N.R. on the east side. The deed was prepared to meet a requirement of the Planning Board in permitting a land separation. The line was moved back one foot to meet the frontage requirement on the pie shaped lot. It was sold by W. J. Higgins to Frank Pedulla and Michael Belvedere.

Through Streets

Third reading was given a by-law designating the through streets in town. The by-law requires the approval of the Department of Transport as well as the Department of Highways.

The following accounts were approved for payment; welfare \$95.59; properties and contingencies \$184.60; waterworks \$2,319.36; streets and walks \$1,977.13; finance \$3,312.24.24; police \$942.50.

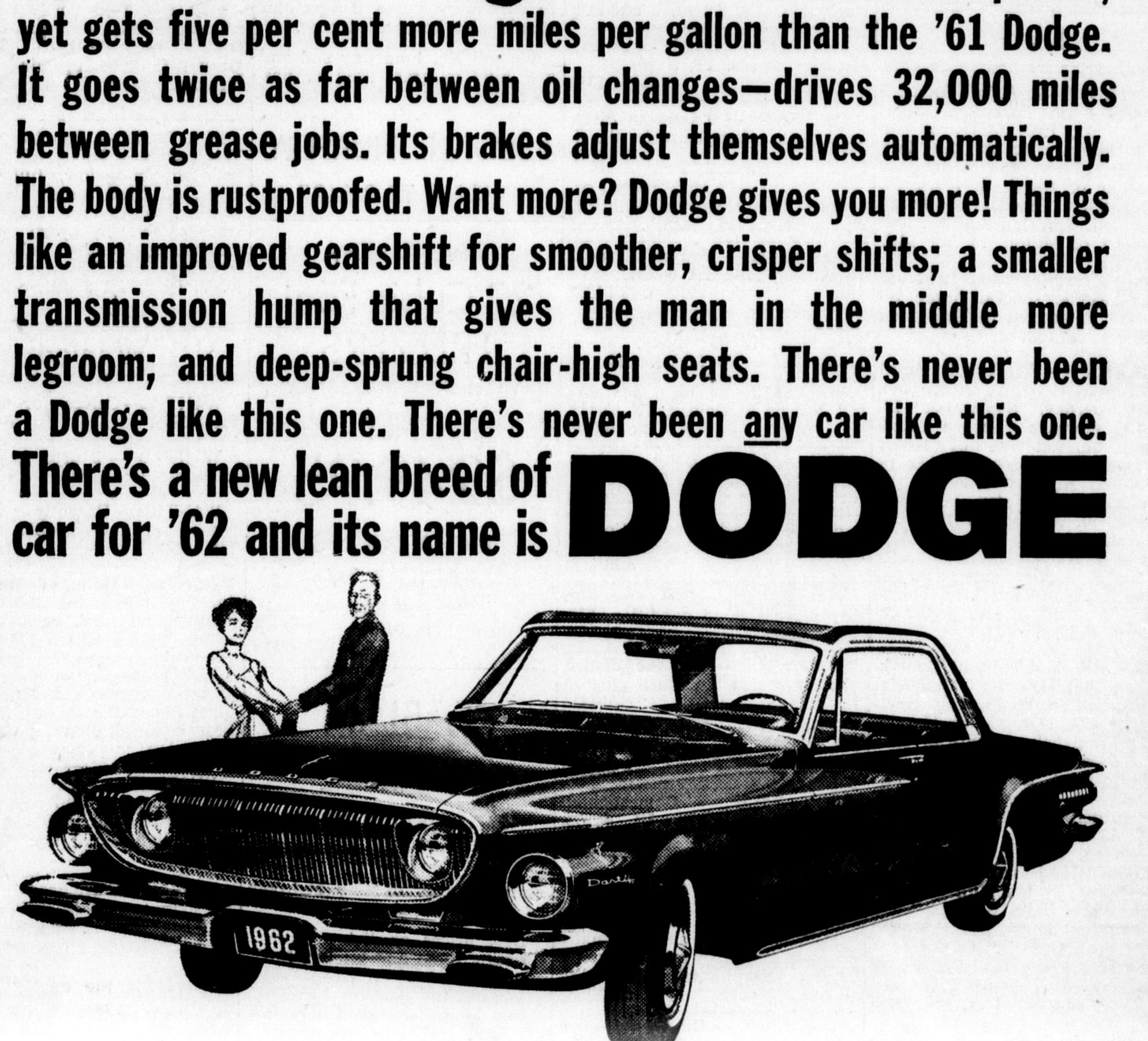
