Nurses' Labor-Saving Device Is a Blessing for Sore Backs

Labor-saving devices have invaded the industrial, commercial and farming industries, and it was only natural that some day there would be a labor-saving device for nearly every profession.

So it isn't unusual that Milton District Hospital this summer installed one new device to save wear and tear on nurses' backs, arms and legs. Their new helper is a Hoyer Lift used to pick up (and even transport) patients who have trouble moving themselves.

Jack Him Up
Gone are the days when slight 110-lb. nurses had to struggle to lift a 250-lb. bedridden coronary or arthritic patient. Now all the nurse needs do is fasten a few belt slings in place, jack up the Hoyer Lift and cart the patient off to another spot in the room, with practically no great exertion of energy at all.

"This device saves on the energy of the nurses and attendants, and makes for far greater efficiency in our hospital," said administrator Mrs. Reta McKenzie. "We can save the cost of injuries to the staff and pay for the \$190 Lift with the time we're not losing through injuries."

The Lift is a simple operation. Nurses place a sling and backrest at the patient's buttocks and back, attach them to the lift, and pump a handle to hydraulically lift the patient from the bed or chair. The machine has a portable base so a patient can be lifted from the bed, wheeled to a lounging chair and lowered right into the chair.

There are also slings which allow a patient to be moved in a reclining position. Any nurse on the staff can operate it.

Although the device isn't a new one (there are some in use at Halton Centennial Manor) it's an innovation for Milton Hospital nurses. They also have a roller device which can slide a patient off an operating table and onto a stretcher.

"Other kinds of work are being mechanized with labor-saving devices," said the administrator, "so now we have things like this lift to speed up the nurse's job and make hospital work more efficient."

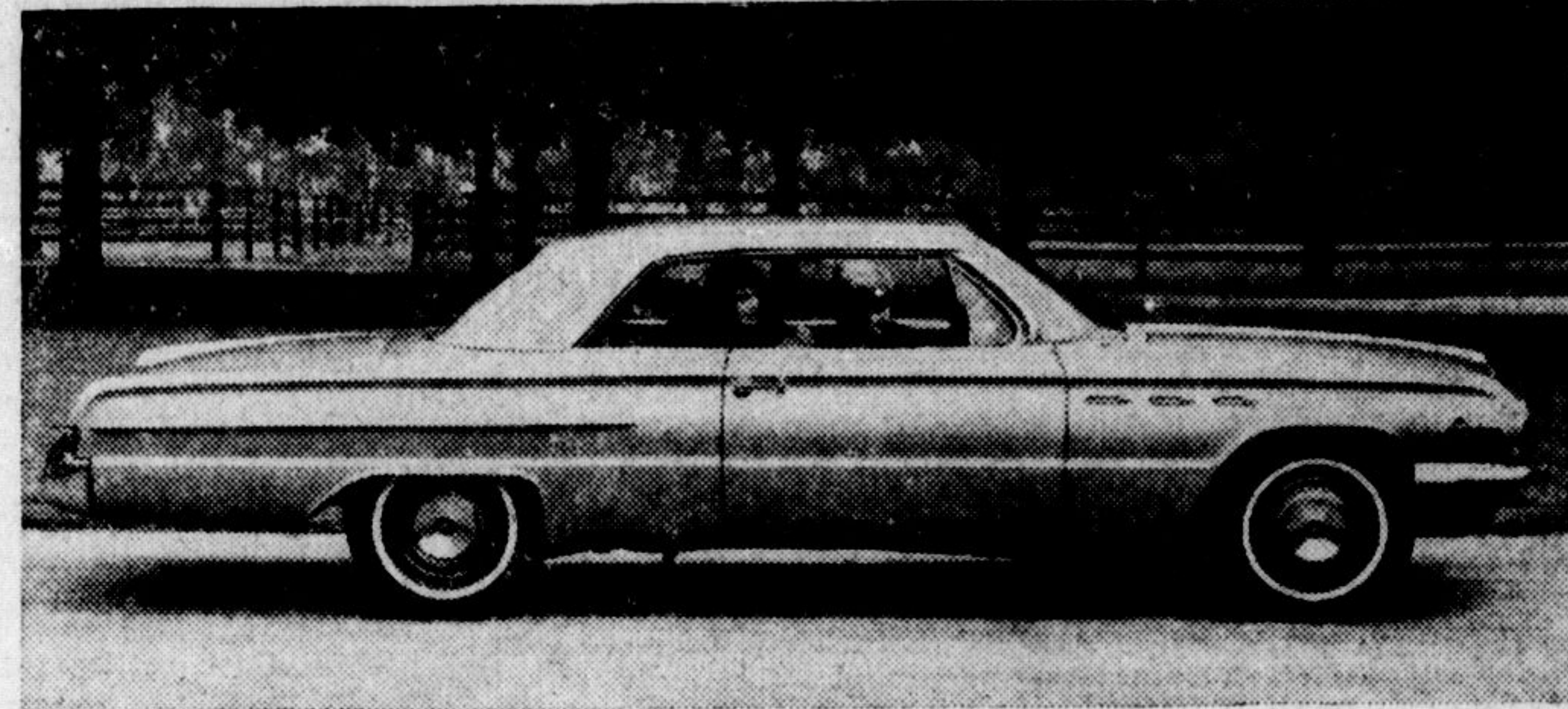
During the proceedings, various aspects of evidence were given, after which Magistrate Langdon dismissed the case.

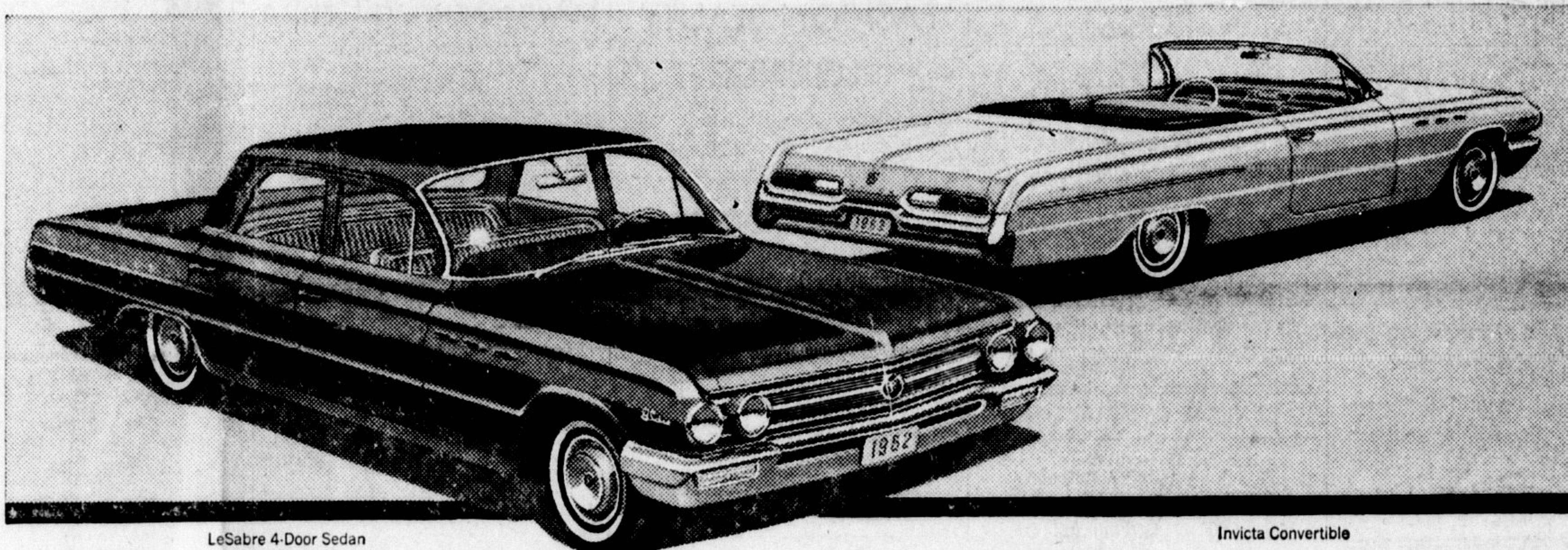

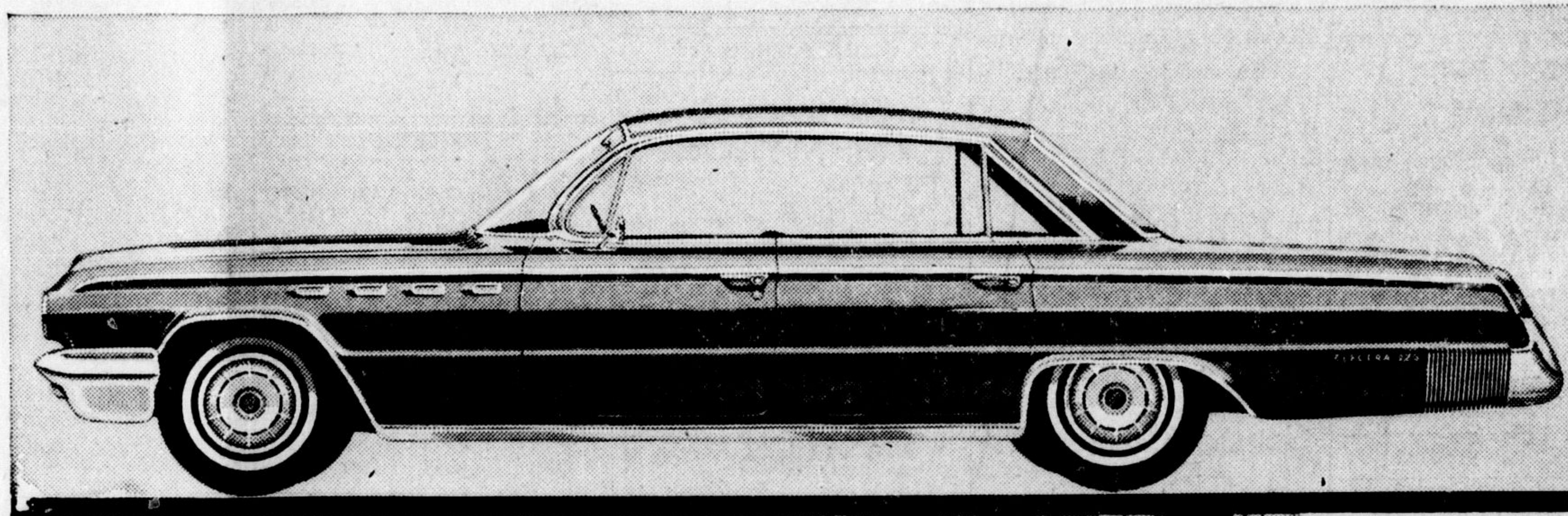
