Lecture on European Agriculture Given Halton County Federation

Halton County Federation of Agriculture held its annual meeting Tuesday afternoon in the Masonic Hall, Milton, with Clifford Brown, president, in the chair. K. A. Stanley, secretary-manager of the Soy Bean and the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board was the speaker.

Mr. Stanley recently returned from Europe where he was a member of the Oil Seeds Trade Mission sponsored by the Federal government. His address touched on the European economic, industrial and agricultural development, also the common market and its effect on Canadian agriculture and industry. He found there were more jobs than people to fill them, that agriculture was highly subsidized as much as 60 per cent, (for instance Germany's support price on wheat is \$2.90 per bushel and France \$2.30 per bushel), their yield per acre in most crops was nearly three times that of Canada's, and the building trade was booming and some of the most modern buildings and housing could be seen there.

The meeting was held following a roast beef dinner served by the Masonic Hall Improvement Board. About 70 attended.

Published Confidential Report Gives Local Board High Rating

A published rating of a reportedly confidential report gave Milton District High School two excellent and one adequate scores this week.

The report was compiled from questions directed to staff members of the individual high schools in the Province.

To the question "How do you rate the attitude of your board towards educational improvement?" Milton District High School received an excellent rating of 82 per cent. To the question "Relations between board and staff?" the Board received an "excellent" at 83 per cent. "Conditions of work in your school", brought an "adequate" response with 57 per cent.

Board Happy

"The published rating of the Milton District High School has given the present Board a great deal of satisfaction", Chairman K. Y. Dick said when confronted with the published report.

The chairman noted the present board of Ross Carbert, Reford Gardhouse, Dr. C. Lucas, Jack Sosnowski, Dr. C. A. Martin and himself had been appointed in January 1960 determined to make Milton District High School a place where students would be happy and conscious of achievement; where teachers would be more content in their employment; and a place of which rate-payers could be proud.

He recalled that the survey in 1960 rated Milton quite low but "it now seems the efforts toward board and staff harmony are bearing fruit." He suggested the

reason for the "adequate" rating on conditions of work was because of the use of two schools and the problems that produces.
