Two years ago every county and district in Ontario conducted a farm accident survey. This survey pointed out the need for Farm Safety. When the survey was completed, county and provincial farm safety councils were formed to direct farm safety programmes in the County and Province.

As an example of one of these programmes, in the first year of operation the Halton Farm Safety Council was responsible for thirty-four farm people taking First Aid courses. These people received training and certificates from St. John Ambulance. While a Crest itself will not
