## Teaching Word Meanings Subject At Capacity Meeting of Assoc.

There was standing room only at Burlington's newest public school, John T. Tuck, on Tuesday, October 24th, when over 300 teachers from Halton County gathered for the first meeting this term of the International Reading Association, Halton Council. Mr. Lawless, Superintendent of Burlington Public Schools, opened the meeting with a few words of welcome from the Burlington Board of Education, and expressed surprised pleasure at the overwhelming turnout.

**Guest Speaker**  
The guest speaker was Donald Urquart, Reading Consultant from North Toronto. Mr. Urquart, born in Hong Kong, was educated in Western China, India and England. He holds a degree from the University of Toronto and has done extensive teaching in Holland for the Canadian Government.

**Should Challenge**  
New words should always challenge the pupil. Yet, some teachers, Mr. Urquart feared, in their eagerness to increase the vocabularies of their young charges, often kill the desire of the children to explore for themselves. He stressed the teacher should create a positive attitude among the pupils toward reading. The use of grouping by senior teachers was essential in order to deal with the vast differences in reading abilities at the senior level. It was emphasized that teachers should select stories from the readers that would appeal to the interests of the class as a whole. Mr. Urquart was introduced by D. Kemp, principal of Lawrie Smith School.

### Town Council Briefs

- Approved payment of \$790 to the Oakville and District Humane Society as the final payment of their 1961 grant of \$1,590.
- Received a letter from Municipal Planning Consultants acknowledging the town's letter retaining them as Planning Consultants to the Town of Milton and advising that they were proceeding immediately with an Annexation Study.
- Heard a report from Bruce McKerr on his attendance at the Sewage and Sanitation Convention in Montreal. Discussions on sanitary land fill operation, sewage treatment plant operation and inspection and maintenance of sewers, were reviewed.
- Agreed to proceed with an asphalt walk on the east side of Court St. to the track so work would not be delayed on the installation of the C.P.R. pedestrian walk when the work is done by the railway.
- Authorized Chief R. Andress to hire addition help to assist the police at Hallowe'en.
- Approved an agreement with the Department of Transport for quarters for testing applicants for drivers permits on one day a week. After several amendments the agreement was approved at \$5 a day for two years.
- Accepted the tender of W. H. Clement at \$156. for painting the clerk's and assessor's office. The tender was the lower of two received.
- Learned that the dayliner on the C.P.R. would be a flag stop in Milton. Last week council was advised it would not be stopping.
- Approved the following accounts for payment, water \$390.14, sewers and sanitation \$1,224.93, streets and walks \$1,034.16, properties and contingencies, \$181.47, welfare \$154.64, fire light and police \$1,121.49, finance \$7,546.14.

Mr. Urquart spoke on the teaching of word meaning. When a pupil meets a new word, Mr. Urquart stressed, the teachers' job was to see to it that the pupil had the equipment to attack the word himself and finally arrive at its meaning. He also pointed out that as the child develops in maturity his understanding of word meanings will deepen. Mr. Urquart urged the teachers always to encourage the children to discover meanings of words from the content in which they are used. "Dissecting" words to discover their roots was not recommended.

### Special Services For Anniversary

Knox Presbyterian Church held its 106th Anniversary services Sunday. Rev. R. A. Jackson, M.A., Knox Presbyterian Church, Galt, gave the sermon in the morning services and Rev. F. G. Stewart, C.D., St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Kitchener, was the guest at the evening service.

At the morning worship service, guest soloist Robert McFarlane of Caledonia, gave the worship in song. The choir anthem was "Praise Be To Thee." Dr. Stewart gave the evening sermon, based on the text "A Great Search." In connection with the anniversary, a turkey dinner was held Monday evening with about 200 of the congregation attending. The dinner was served by the Ladies' Aid and was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Following the dinner, Mrs. Harold Magee sang two solos and the film "The Hidden Heart" was shown.

**Beaver Pelts**  
Kenora district trappers realized \$160,631.86 from the sale of 25,647 pelts taken during the 1960-61 fur trapping season. The yield of 11,357 beavers valued at approximately \$110,000 again was the most important fur trapped. Mink, down in production by 546 pelts, yet accounted for 21% of the trappers' revenue and, with beaver, represented 90% of their season's income.

**Indicates Interest**  
The response to this first meeting of the school year of the International Reading Association indicates the interest of the teachers of Halton County in one of the most important associations in the teaching profession. The executive is anticipating an ever greater response at its next meeting in Milton on January 17.

### Deny Liability On Water Break

Liability was denied by insurance adjusters Adamson's Ltd. for Kenmore Building Supplies, charged by Milton with damaging the town's 12 inch water line. A letter to Council Monday suggested Kenmore could not be held responsible for the damage to the water main because it was not pointed out by the owners and there was no reasonable warning indicating its presence below ground. Damage to the line amounted to \$321.40. The firm had been test drilling for a gravel supply. Council instructed the matter be referred to the solicitor for discussion with the adjusters.
