

## Glen Not Playing Santa Claus; Hold Spectator From Third Slot

Glen Williams entry in the Milton Industrial hockey league turned back the hustling Hamilton Spectator team Thursday night, in its bid to gain third spot in the loop standings. Spectator, sitting in fourth and with a chance to grab third ahead of the P.L. Nip Gervais and Bob Sales each notched a hat trick in fine scoring style to lead P. L. Robertson to the win against Gerrys. Tom Barrett, third in the league scoring, scored his 14th of the season, and other singles were scored by Graham Gillies and Larry Phillips.

Bruce Bell, in one of his better showings in years, had a hat trick for Gerrys. Gord Bell, Doug Black and Wayne Timbers clicked for one apiece.

There were seven minor penalties in the Glen-Spec game with four to Spectator . . . Six were doled out in the other tilt, three each to P.L.R. and Gerrys . . . Glen Williams now has seven wins, a loss and a tie for 15 points and top spot in the six team loop.
