Willmott "Doggone Sick" Threatens Resignation

Councillor Joe Willmott, ward one representative on Oakville council, is "... so doggone sick of 11.30 sitting, I think I'll resign from council."

Oakville council has a procedural by-law providing for its adjournment at 11 o'clock. However last week Councillor McLean Anderson brought up a question concerning flooding conditions in Oakville.

Near Deadline

The question was tabled close to adjournment time and discussion continued for several minutes before Councillor Willmott asked why the matter had not been brought up earlier, if it was so important. Councillor F. O. Gallagher replied it had not been possible to bring the matter up any earlier.

Council adjourned without taking any action on the question, after several heated exchanges.

Brampton Garage Contract Awarded

Provincial Public Works Minister Ray Connell Tuesday awarded the contract for constructing an eight-bay patrol storage garage for the Department of Highways at Brampton to Ramsay Contracting Co. Ltd., Toronto, whose bid of \$62,715 was the lowest of 13 tendering for the job.

The garage will be built at the north-east corner of the intersection of Highways 401 and 10. It will be one-storey, 163 feet by 42 feet, and of brick, concrete block and steel joist construction with flat roof and concrete foundations.

Contained in the structure will be eight garages with wooden overhead doors, tool and storage rooms, lunchroom, locker room and office section.

Blame Heater Elements For Two Fires -- Bureau

Cone-shaped electric heating elements have been blamed for at least two recent fires in Halton County, and the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau has been alarmed at the method in which some of these heating elements have been used.

Bureau members found one man using the element to thaw frozen pipes, and another hung it under his car hood as a block heater. The open elements cause a heavy heat transfer and can set fire to nearby objects too easily.

For Heaters Only
Although they are CSA-Approved, these elements are intended for use in portable space heaters, and are illegal as well as dangerous if used on wall sockets or extension cords.

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Largest Auditorium Planned in Oakville

Oakville may get a hotel with Canada's largest auditorium. Oakville council meeting in committee last week recommend approval of a bylaw to build a \$2,500,000 convention hotel on Highway 5 just west of Seventh Line. The bylaw will go to Ontario Municipal Board for approval.

Mr. Huddlestone, of Dixie, and Thomas Hays, of Hays Farms, Oakville, are promoting the hotel.

He said the auditorium could hold 2,000 which would make it the largest in the county. They were planning to build on 20 acres. The amenities at the hotel would include a swimming pool.

The by-law was originally submitted to the O.M.B. by the old Trafalgar Township council but it was returned for approval of the joint council.

Horticultural Notes

Flowering bulbs such as daffodils, tulips, hyacinths and crocuses, that have bloomed indoors this spring, can still be used again if given a little care. The secret here is in giving the

foliage a chance to make food to store in the bulb for next year.

When the bloom fades cut off the flower stalk and water regularly, applying soluble fertilizer once a month, or better, scratch bone meal into the soil. Leave in a cold window where the temperature is 45 deg. to 60 deg. In 6 to 10 weeks. The foliage will start turning brown and dry. Now withhold water till the pot dries out, then store in a dry frost-free place.

In September, clean off the bulbs dust with disinfectant, and plant the plumpest, firmest ones outside. They now are ready to bloom again next spring. These will not force again inside, so leave them in the garden.
