alic acid with frequent rinsing may be needed for ink, copying and red ink require methylated spirits plus a little acetic or white vinegar which should be very quickly blotted and followed by the detergent. In the case of salines, urine and starchy foods one egg cupful of white vinegar should be added to each pint of detergent.

For cigarette, grass, fruit, rust, burned pile should be shaved down and treated with detergent. Grass stains should be mopped with methylated spirits then treated with detergent. Fruit juice should be attacked with the detergent and then if necessary with methylated spirits. Rust requires a strong solution of oxalic acid after an application of the detergent, but if the mark is an old one it is better treated by an expert. Salt affects colour as well as attracting dampness and should be thoroughly vacuumed.



Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority officials have branded as "untrue" the recent rumors that the cement in the new Kelso Dam had cracked.

Field Officer David Murray said when the water reached a 20 foot level, some seepage was found, but when it was checked it was found the seepage was coming through a series of filters, a normal occurrence at a new dam. There was no sign of inferior workmanship or poor concrete, he said.

This week the lake reached the 20 foot level. Maximum depth is 30 feet.






