Nixes Health Plan Open Debate Harley Sees M.P.'s Inconsistency

Liberal candidate Dr. Harry Harley's challenge to Health Minister Hon. J. Waldo Monteith to an open debate on a National Health Plan has precipitated a flurry of replies to the challenge.

Dr. Harley's challenge to the Health Minister inviting Mr. Monteith to an open debate on the merits of the Liberal health plan and the failure of the government to implement any health plan, was refused. Mr. Monteith said in a telegram to the Liberal candidate that since the question of a National Health Plan is presently under study by a Royal Commission, "such discussion would be neither useful nor proper."

Bring Into Open

To this, Dr. Harley replied, "I feel that all issues, including a medical health plan, should be discussed openly and in public... the Liberal Party has investigated a National Health Plan thoroughly and finds it economically feasible... this is another example of Tory refusal to discuss pertinent issues publicly... similar to Mr. Diefenbaker's refusal to debate on TV with Mr. Pearson."

Sandy Best, present M.P. for Halton and recently nominated to contest the riding in June, replied to Dr. Harley's challenge that comprehensive health legislation will be introduced at the next session of the House by the government, if the Conservatives are returned.

Dr. Harley then pointed out a contradiction in Mr. Monteith's

statement that a Royal Commission is presently studying the problem and Mr. Best's statement that a plan will be introduced by the government at the next session of the House. "Royal Commissions have been known to take years to finish, yet this is Mr. Monteith's sole reason for refusing to debate with me publicly. On the other hand, Mr. Best's statement indicates, in contradiction of Mr. Monteith, that all of the necessary studies are complete. Perhaps Mr. Best and Mr. Monteith are not aware that they are candidates of the same party, which would indicate that there should be at least some consistency in their two positions."

Speaking of Mr. Best, Dr. Harley went on, "I cannot help but ask if he is trying to lead us into believing that he already knows what the Royal Commission's Report is going to reveal this fall. What if the Commission does not recommend a plan of adequate medical coverage for us all? He seems to have jumped the gun."

Scout Paper Drive Changes to Monday

Other features outlined are the use of soft water and the gas fired continuous supply of hot water. The plaza store is finished in a yellow and white decor with fluorescent lighting. Coin changers, soap dispensers and plastic bags are available.

The store will be open 24 hours a day and caretaking will be by Milton Janitor Service. It is expected the operation will be handled locally after it gets started.

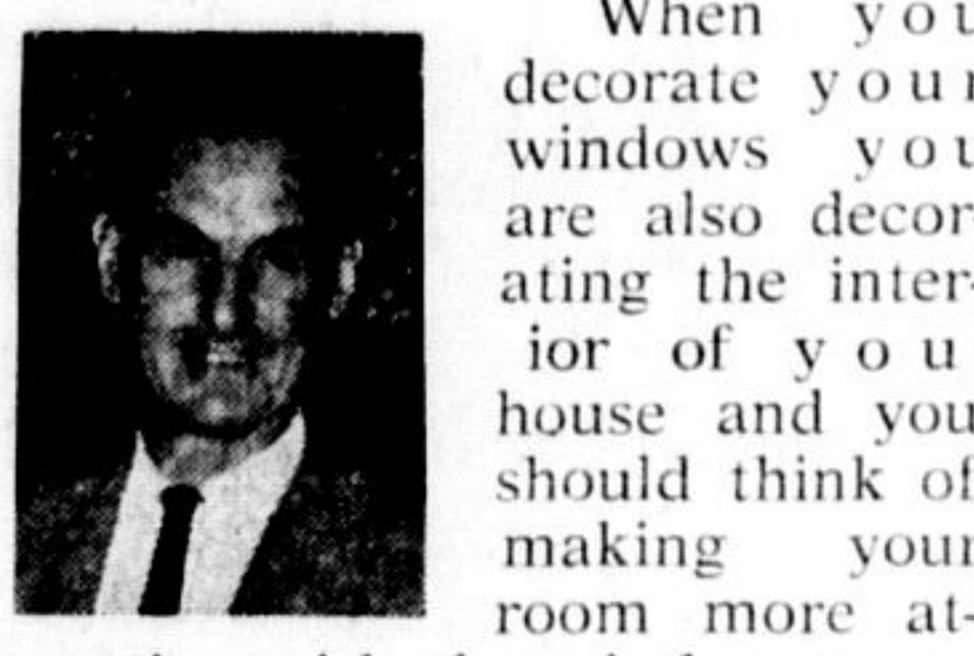
