Seek Revision of Truck Legislation To Aid Drivers, Make More Jobs, Taxes

Legislation aimed at increasing highway safety, providing better working conditions for truckers, lessening unemployment, saving tax dollars and reduce road damages has been urged by the Oakville and District Labor Council. A brief submitted to the municipal councils of Burlington, Milton, Acton, Georgetown, Oakville, Clarkson and Port Credit by the Labor Council contained five specific recommendations:

—The reduction of the working hours of the tank and automobile transport industry to 45 hours per week. The Council claims that working hours from 60 to 90 hours weekly are quite common on provincial highways and that reduction of these hours will have a double-barrelled advantage — an increase in highway safety, and "further employment in a chronic unemployment period."

—Rigid physical fitness examinations of drivers in this branch of the trucking industry.

—Maximum speed laws as presently exist in other provinces.

—Gross weight limitations for the transport industry to prevent the constant increase in damage to Ontario roads.

Better Taxation —Proper taxation for transport firms in accordance with actual use of highways and revision of legislation for truck mileage.

The brief has also been submitted to the MPP's of Peel and Hal-

ton Counties and will be forwarded to all Labor Councils in Ontario as well as the Ontario Federation of Labor for consideration.

G. G. Heym, president of the Oakville District Labor Council, entitles the proposals "our crusade and endeavors for a fair and justified revision of our highway legislation."

Offices Here
