Jehovah's Witnesses Convention Features Outstanding Speakers

The three day circuit convention of Jehovah's Witnesses at the Milton High School ended Sunday afternoon when a crowd of 624 persons overflowed the auditorium to hear the public discourse "Who Will Rule The World?". The witnesses represent-

ed seven congregations in this district.

Forrest Lee, presiding minister for the Milton Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, introduced the speaker Thomas R. Jones, Supervisor of Ministers for Southern Ontario. Mr. Jones said, "The

East and the West vie for world supremacy. Who will rule? This is the issue pressing for settlement today."

Mr. Jones, quoting from Luke 1:32.33 showed that Jehovah God's Son will be installed as world ruler and king of the kingdom and this will happen in our generation. He further asserted that Matthew chapter 24 gives much evidence such as pestilence, famines, wars, and delinquency, that will mark the end of this system we live under. The speaker closed with remarks, "Shortly, Armageddon, the battle of the Great Day of God the Almighty, will remove all opposers to the Divine Will just as it has been done in heaven. Who Will Rule the World? not the East or the West, but God's Kingdom."

Local Minister

Saturday morning Derrick Hornsby, a local Milton resident and assistant presiding minister of the Milton congregation, spoke on Psalms 147:1 which calls upon all clear thinking persons to praise and speak of Jehovah God as this is pleasing to Him. Mrs. Derrick Hornsby also demonstrated proper preaching methods when contacting interested people in the ministerial work.

Saturday afternoon the assembly heard a discourse on the importance of total water immersion, which action signifies that the individual completely dedicates his life to serve Jehovah God henceforth. The evening program encouraged more of the delegates to consider the possibilities of being full time missionaries, not only in Canada but other parts of the world. Jehovah's Witnesses are more active than any other religious group, now witnessing in 188 countries.

The closing sessions by demonstration illustrated that all persons are busy but Christians particularly today must keep a scriptural growth and balance in a moving world. They must keep a schedule of activity, otherwise other activities will overshadow these endeavours.

Growing Gradually

At the closing sessions on Sunday, John Warburton spoke on the subject "Add To Your Knowledge Every Day." Based on Isaiah 54:13, the speaker emphasized the importance of gradually growing spiritually by daily increasing our knowledge of the Bible, which if continued, gives strength and courage to all persons. The next speaker, Floyd Hollenbeck, circuit supervisor, gave scriptural admonition on how to hold your Christian position and not be overworked by many false ambitions.

The closing talk by Thomas Jones on "Right View of the Work Ahead", explained the great increase of Jehovah's Witnesses in Canada must be met with positive thinking and planning, to help these people find their place in this rapidly growing organization.

The assembled delegates enthusiastically supported the expression of appreciation by the chairman of the Convention. The wonderful co-operation of the school board and staff, the local business men and the citizens at large, helped to make this first assembly at Milton a huge success. Guests were fed hot meals each day at the Agricultural Hall.

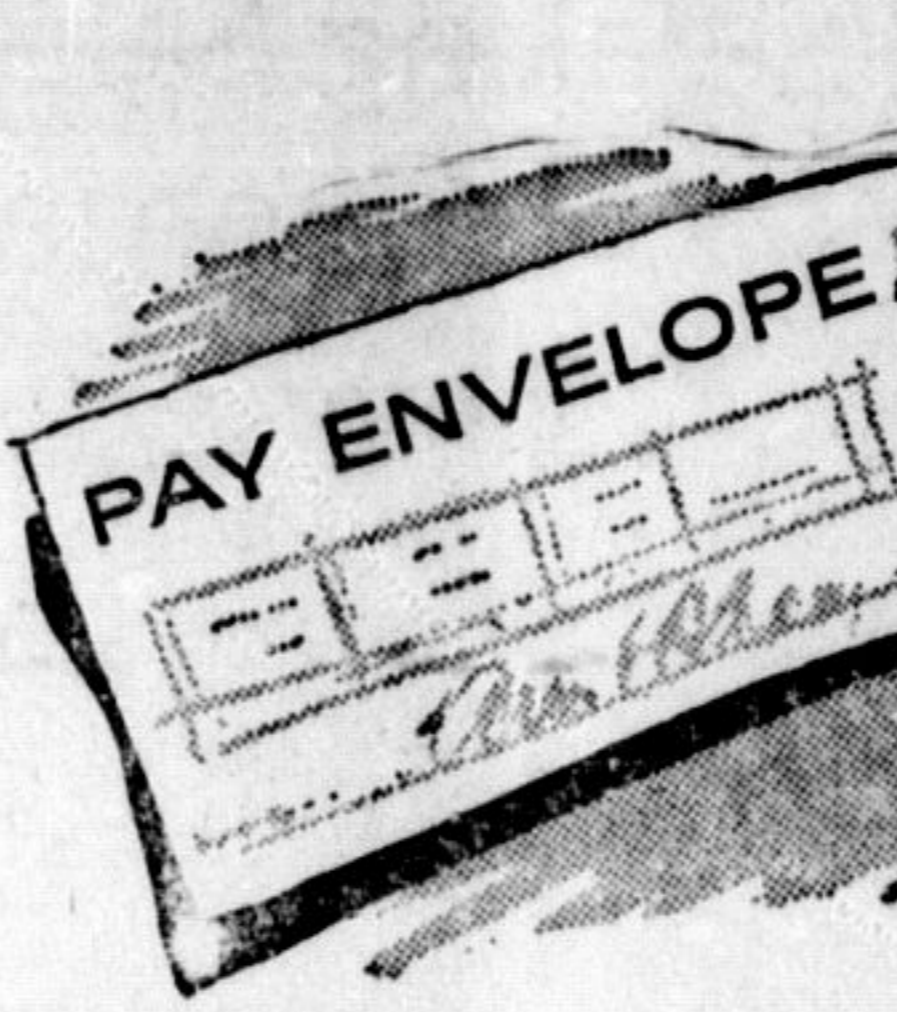
