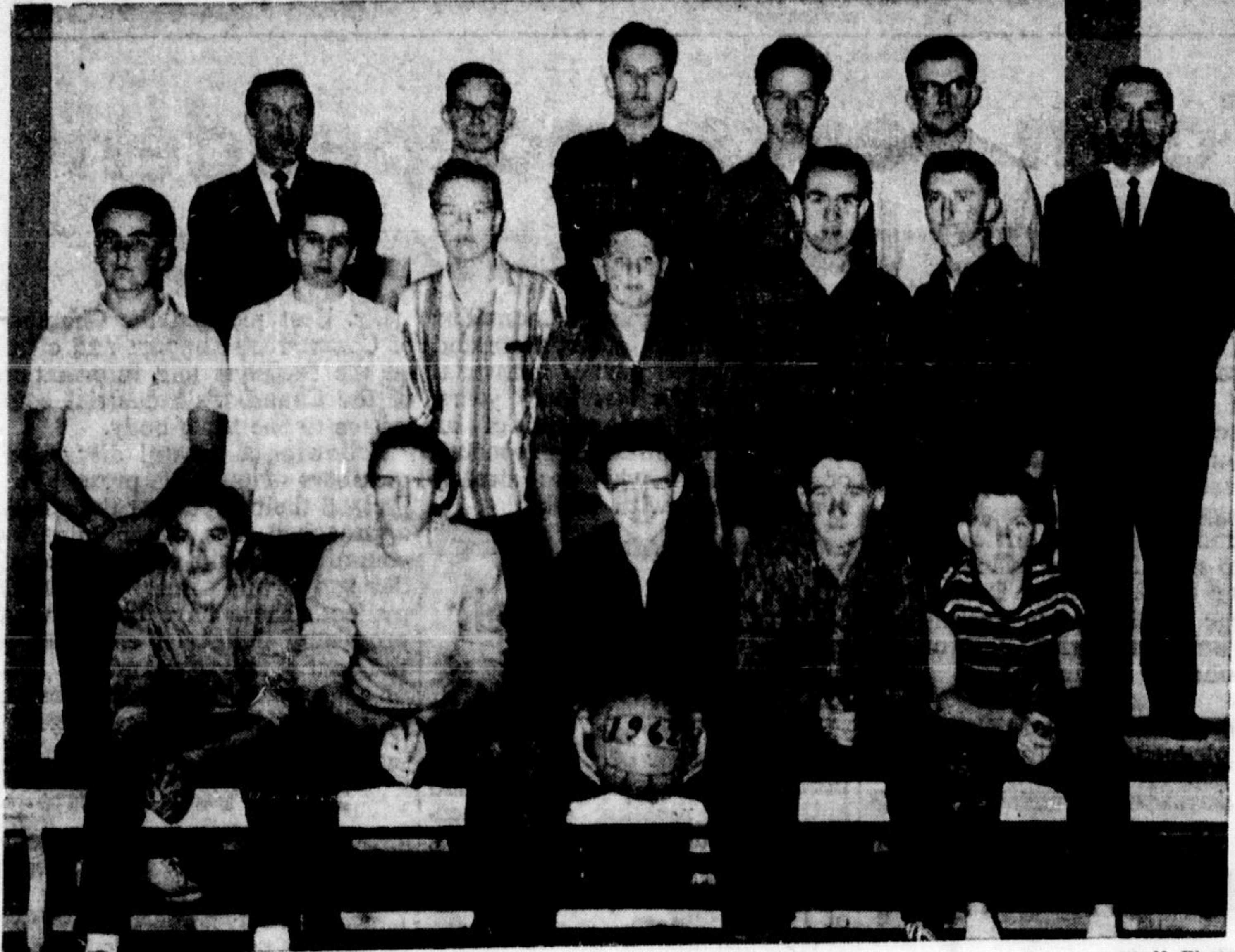

Bernice Moore, Top Graduate Gives Commencement Address

Bernice Moore, top student in Grade 13 last year at Milton District High School, delivered the commencement valedictory on behalf of her fellow students Friday evening at the annual commencement exercises. The following is the text of her speech:

"Tonight it is my privilege, on behalf of the graduating class of 1962, to express our feelings as we take our formal leave of Milton High School. It wasn't long ago that we first entered Milton high school and this evening was but a date in the dim, distant future. Now graduation is here and we can hardly believe that time has gone by so quickly.

"My only regret about this evening is that more of my ex-classmates aren't receiving diplomas. As to be expected there has been much speculation as to why the graduating class is so small. Two extreme opinions seem to be dom-

inating. On one side the blame is placed entirely with the students, and on the other side it is placed entirely with the teachers. Of course neither of these views are completely factual. I realize that many of us did not work as hard as we might have, and that many of us left our studying until the end when it became an absolute necessity. I'd hesitate to blame the teachers because in my estimation we had good teachers and they did their best to help us pass the final exams.

"We have now completed our high school careers. Although we regret leaving Milton High, the pleasant memories attached to it and the friends we have made over the past five years (or six or seven as the case may be), we are looking forward to the new frontiers ahead of us.

"Each of us is commencing his chosen task in life. Each of us

will encounter problems that must be solved alone. But whatever difficulties may be ahead, whatever tasks may confront us, the knowledge and courage and skills which have become ours in these past years will stand us in good stead. As the years go by, time may weaken our memories of each other, names may be forgotten and distance separate us from one another. However, we will never forget our high school and will always remain loyal to it."
