Brian Halliday, vice president of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children, described the school as "one of the most thoughtful schools for retarded children that I have seen."

He reminded the gathering however, that "working with retarded children is like mountain climbing, when you reach a goal such as this building, you must look around and see the other challenges that are yet to be conquered." He suggested that work be continued towards the setting up of classes for pre-school children and adult workshops.

Mr. Addison presented Mrs. Helen Howard of Milton with a life membership in the North Halton Association for Retarded Children. Mrs. Howard was on the first committee, when the Sunshine school was begun in 1955, and has been active on the executive and as a parent ever since.

Unique Place

Harold Henry, chairman of the program, described the school as a "unique school and a well equipped institution."

Architect J. M. Martin presented the keys of the building contractor Fred Zorge, who in turn gave them to Mrs. R. P. E. Jeffares, principal of the school. Mrs. Jeffares then turned the keys over to Gerry Addison. In giving Mr. Addison the keys, she commented that "without his help this school would never have become a reality."

Depict "Grace"

Twenty slides, depicting a "Retarded Child's Grace," were shown during the program. The chairman, Mr. Henry also introduced Judge George E. Elliot, Dr. Harry Harley, Halton M.P., and Bill Kirk, executive director of the Ontario Association of Retarded Children.

Following the program, refreshments were served. The Coachmen Car Club members directed traffic outside the school during the busy periods on Saturday and Sunday.

"Misunderstanding"

OMB Refuses Debenture Issue

The Ontario Municipal Board has refused permission for the town of Milton to debenture \$3,600 for a proposed watermain along Parkway Drive, councillors learned Monday at their regular meeting.

But the refusal seems to be a misunderstanding, solicitor K. Y. Dick explained. "They must think our auditor's report shows that we are not making enough money in our waterworks department," he said. But the solicitor explained that two years ago the town had floated a \$15,000 capital expenditure for waterworks out of current revenue and surplus.

The \$3,600 is the town's share of the cost of the watermain along Parkway Drive to serve the School for the Deaf. The remainder of the \$6,631.75 job is to be paid by the Department of Public Works.

Council asked the solicitor to notify the Municipal Board that the town's water rate structure was in good shape, and pursue the approval of the debenture issue.

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
