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Knox Ordains, Inducts Five To Eldership of Congregation

In a ceremony descended from one of the oldest acts of the Christian Church, the choice and installation of a successor to Judas in the apostolic band, Knox Presbyterian Church last Sunday ordained and inducted five men to the eldership of the church and inducted a sixth to the eldership of the congregation.

Almost a year ago the Kirk Session resolved to add to its number to bring itself up to the necessary strength to carry out its work in the congregation. In June the members of the congregation voted by secret ballot for the members of their choice for this office.

Study Doctrine, Law

Subsequently those elected, oncerning Milton fans selected, Milton of study of doctrine and church law to prepare them for their duties. This process came to a conclusion with the answering of the ordination and induction questions and prayer in the presence of the congregation last Sunday morning, a service in which the congregation also voted its support and obedience to the elders.

Received into the Kirk Session, they will now share in the govern-
ment of the congregation in all its aspects. In addition, on ap-
pointment, they will share in the higher courts of the church, the Presbytery, the Synod and the General Assembly.

Ordain for Life

Their ordination is for life, though, should they move to another congregation, they will not be active elders until elected there. Of the following six men, thus received into the Session, one, was ordained previously by another Presbyterian Church; he was therefore only inducted into the office in Knox Church.

Thomas Amis is a native of Rugby, England, who spent 11 years of his youth in New York City, and came to Canada from England nine years ago, since becoming a naturalized Canadian. He has lived in Milton for the past four years and is employed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as a radio technician at the Hornby transmitter. He is an associate member of the Institute of Radio Engineers. He has one son, a Baptist minister in Nova Scotia.

In Milton 15 Years

Robert Mackay, born and raised in New York, is likewise a Can-

adian citizen today and has resided in Milton for the past fifteen years. Having served with the United States Army Air Force in World War II, he is now working for the Bell Telephone Company as a telephone technician. Mr. Mackay, the father of two girls, is an active figure in community affairs, is Vice President of the Home and School movement on the Board of Managers of the church and has taught Church School for the past ten years.

Unlike these men, Kenneth Marshall was born and has lived near Milton all his life with the exception of the war years when he served with the R.C.A.F. and saw service in England and India. He operates his own farm just outside Milton and has served on the Board of Managers and has taught Church School. He has six children and in becoming an elder, he joins his father who has been on the Kirk Session for years.

On Board Five Years

A son of Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, James Schofield, came to Ontario nine years ago and has lived in Milton for the last seven years. The father of one daughter, he is employed by Omega Engines at Milton as a buyer. He has been a member of the Board of Managers of Knox Church for five years and is presently secretary of the Board.

Cameron Wilson is also a native of Milton. He resides and is engaged in mixed farming on his farm near Milton. He has been a member of the Knox choir since he was 16 and is a member of the Knox Male Quartette. He has served on the Board of Managers for the past eight years. He is a past president of both the Milton and the Halton Junior Farmers, has served as chairman of the Board of Managers and as secretary of the Church School.

As a previously ordained elder of St. David's Presbyterian Church, Campbellville, where he was born and raised, Robert Laking was not ordained, but inducted into office in Knox Church. He has lived in Milton for the past three years since retiring from farming. He is now active as a real estate salesman in this town. He was a member of the choir in Campbellville and is serving the same function here. He is the father of four sons, one in Puerto Rico.
