Big Congregation Honors Rector Church Marks 125th Anniversary

By Mrs. Edward Robertson On Sunday, November 4 a large congregation gathered at St. Stephen's Anglican church to honor their rector, the Rev. J. E. Maxwell on the occasion of his completion of fifteen years service in this parish.

After the service all were invited to a cup of tea in the basement parish hall, when Alan Harrop, the people's warden presented Rev. and Mrs. Maxwell with a lazy boy chair, a set of TV hostess tables and a purse of money in recognition of his service.

Special Cake Buffet lunch was served by the ladies of the church. Mrs. Frank Weller, president of the WA and Mrs. Pat Flippance, president of the Guild poured tea. A cake made by Mrs. Frank Chisholm and decorated by Mrs. Vernon Archer centred the table. The cake was in shape of a Bible and was encircled by miniature prayer books, depicting the names and dates of all the ministers who have served this church since its erection in 1837.

Rev. Maxwell was pleasantly surprised and expressed his thanks for the gifts. He remarked that the accomplishments over the years as a result of rector and congregation working together have been a great satisfaction to him.

Electricians Need First Aid Training, Says Inquest Jury

"Journeyman electricians should take a course in first aid before receiving their papers," the coroner's jury recommended at the inquest into the death of Vaughan Verner, a 17-year-old Hamilton youth, held on Wednesday of last week. Mr. Verner was electrocuted while working near high voltage wires at the new School for the Deaf on October 10.

The jury, consisting of Neil McPhail foreman, Gordon Strain, Len Ste. Marie, Douglas Ptolemy and Roy Smith, recommended that closer supervision be given to types of construction involving high voltage wiring and that more adequate equipment be used for particular jobs.

Reduce Mishaps Crown Attorney P. K. McWilliams stated at the outset of the inquest that its purpose was to help reduce industrial accidents.

Mr. Verner was killed while helping to erect the last of 39 light standards at the new School for the Deaf. Barry Fraser, a first class journeyman electrician, was driving the truck at the time of the accident. Mr. Fraser testified that he was backing the truck up to the cement base where the standard was to be erected when he heard Vaughan holler "stop". He immediately put his foot on the clutch, stopped the truck and looked around. Then he saw a flash and Gerry Maloney, a fellow helper, was thrown to the ground. Fraser then rushed for assistance.

Suffers Burns Gerald Maloney, 16, of Stratton Rd., Bronte, was the third workman on the light standard at the time of the accident. Mr. Maloney, who was in the hospital 12 days following the accident, suffered burns to the hands, feet and chest. He testified he was directing the truck into the proper position for the erection of the standard at the time of the accident.

Thomas Potts and Derek Dickenson, who were working near the scene of the accident, testified that on seeing the accident, they rushed to the victims in an attempt to help them. Mr. Potts

described the erection of the light standard as being a "blind operation". Mr. Dickenson said that the equipment being used for the job was inadequate as the pole was too large.

Gave Respiration Dr. R. A. MacKay said that he was called to the scene of the accident at 3:30 p.m. on October 10. When he reached the scene, he found Verner lying on the ground unconscious. "A man was properly giving artificial respiration to Verner," he said. Dr. MacKay said that he then took over the administering of the artificial respiration. Halton County Coroner Dr. C. K. Stevenson read the autopsy report that stated that Vaughan Verner had died of cardiac arrest.

Dr. MacKay said that "cardiac arrest is nearly always the cause of death in electric shock cases." He said that he had given Verner an external heart-massage that is sometimes used to start the heart beating again.

Dr. Stevenson pointed out that the method of external heart-massage could be taught to electricians for cases where severe electric shock injures workmen.

Police Chief Ray Andress, Paul Verner, brother of the deceased, and Edward Ramsbottom of Milton Hydro also testified at the inquest.

Sarnia Man Dies 401 Near Milton

Eugene White, 41, of Murphy Rd. in Sarnia, was killed instantly Thursday afternoon when his small car veered out of control on Highway 401 near Milton.

Const. Tom Penrice of North Halton O.P.P. reported the car careened, then flipped over and rolled several times. The driver was thrown from the wreckage before it came to rest in the median. White was attempting to negotiate a curve on the Highway, 1.4 miles west of Highway 25, when the accident happened.

Coroner Dr. G. E. Sver pronounced the man dead. An inquest is pending.

Maurice Grimes To Show Slides



Maurice J. Grimes was born in Navan, Ontario, and educated in Ottawa, after which he went into mining and aeronautical engineering, both of which had greatly attracted him since his early youth.

While engaged in these pursuits he became interested in the work of the Canadian Cancer Society and the many volunteers who belonged to it. More than 15 years ago he joined the Society as a volunteer and in 1952 he was appointed Executive Secretary of the Ontario Division.

In 1959 Mr. Grimes was made Executive Director. The growth of the Society has been phenomenal and Mr. Grimes has played an important and integral part in this expansion.

He has recently returned from a trip to the Soviet Union, where he attended the 8th International Cancer Congress in Moscow as a representative of Ontario Division. The many calls for talks and the showing of his pictures from this trip since his return have kept him busy indeed.

He will show the picture at Milton District High School on Thursday, November 15 when the Milton and District Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society sponsors a panel discussion on cancer problems.

Two-Miles Down On New CN Track

Work continues this week on the laying of the new C.N.R. track from Georgetown to Milton, and to date about two miles of double track have been laid south from Georgetown.

Project director J. L. Cann said grading of the various sections of the access-line from Milton to Bayview Ave. ranged from 60 to 100 per cent complete. Sub-ballast is being distributed on the line between Milton and Georgetown. Tenders have been called for the installation of automatic signalling devices between Milton and Hamilton.

Mr. Cann reported the line will be controlled by a central traffic control. Inside the hump yard a complex of television, two-way radio, radar, electronic equipment and computers will be utilized to sort out freight trains. Some 7,000 cars a day can be handled at the Toronto yard. It is expected about 25 trains a day will pass Milton when the new line is completed in 1965.

Councillors Agree Seek New Assessor

Due to illness and an extended absence of the town assessor this past few months, Milton Councillors Monday decided to advertise for a replacement.

"We have discussed this with the assessor (Frank McNiven) and he agrees," said councillor Charles Menefy. Mr. McNiven has been in hospital and at home, under doctor's care, since the end of August. "The present assessor would still be available to the town in an advisory capacity," said the councillor.
