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Inferior Work on Pool Apron Worries Conservation Group

Reports of inferior work at the Kelso Dam swimming pool, attempts to purchase three properties in Oakville, and a lease negotiation with Glen Eden Ski Club officials occupied members of the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority at a meeting on Thursday October 25.

Field Officer Dave Murray pointed out work on a new concrete apron surrounding the Kelso swimming pool was inferior, as the blocks were not laid squarely, and overlapped, and expansion joints were leaking. It was suggested payment on the contract should be withheld until the work is done properly.

Flood Plains
The Authority heard a report on flood plain land purchases in Oakville. An offer of \$2,000 is to be made for two Department of Highways parcels totalling 10 acres, on Kerr St. Another property has been taken over by a bank and the Authority is awaiting word on an offer to purchase. A third property has been evaluated but the owner has

turned down the Authority's offer.

The Authority referred a proposal for a \$2,500 soil study report on the Kelso Dam, to the finance committee. The study would determine the effect of the dam and reservoir on the ground water.

Glen Eden Ski Tows, which operates a ski club on the Kelso Conservation property, was given a 10 year lease with an additional five year option.

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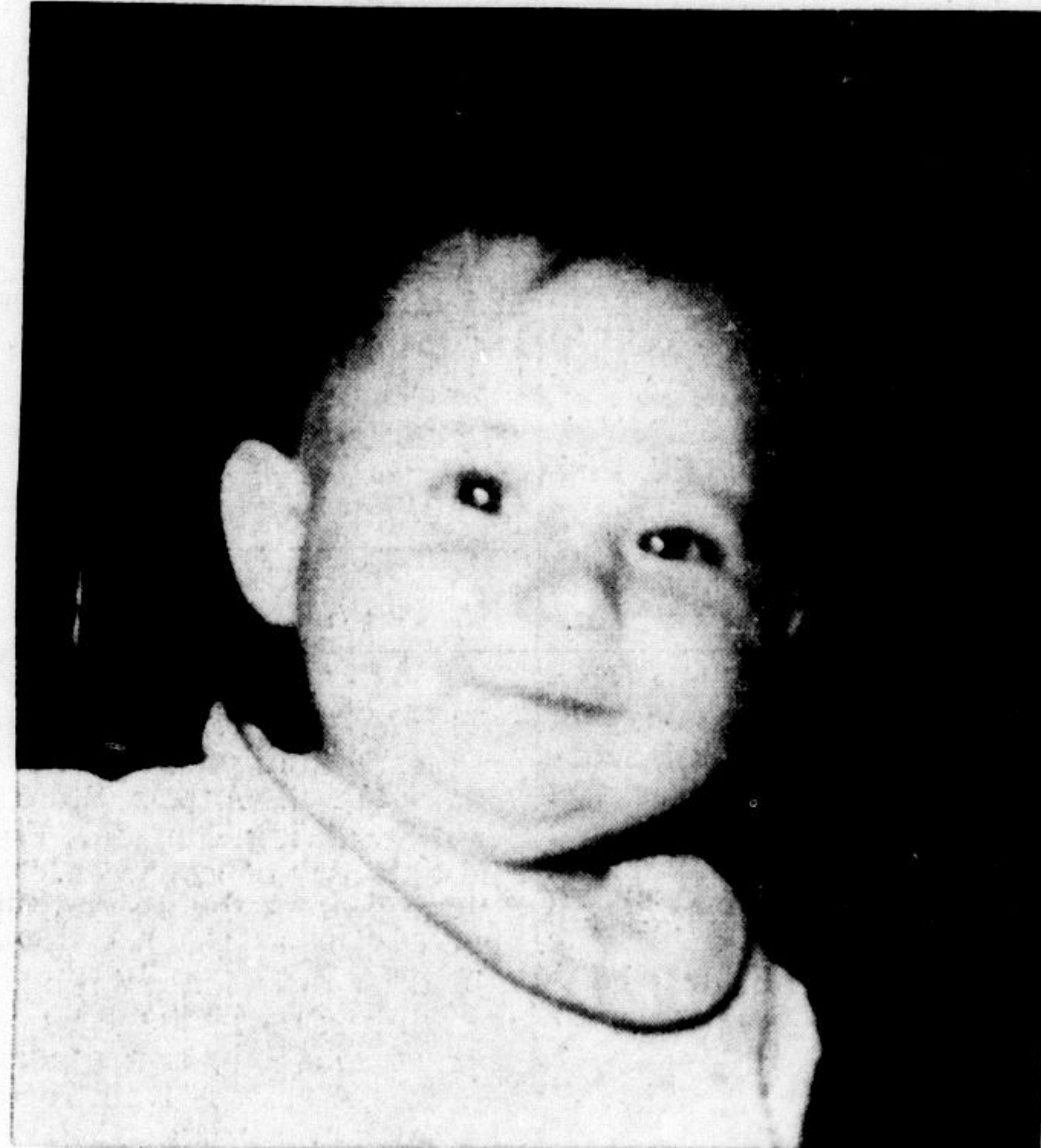
