What do you know about apples?

Do you know, for instance, that apples are one of the best health-giving fruits available throughout the year? Do you also know that apple seeds were among the first to be planted in early Canada?

These facts may not seem too interesting—except to whet one's appetite for a bite into a juicy specimen. Apples are like that. Even after a substantial meal, many people enjoy munching on a firm, polished apple — even when candied or other treats fail to tempt them.

By offering apples to children after a meal — or better still, by keeping apples where they can help encourage — busy mothers can encourage children to practice a good eating habit. Apples help keep teeth clean and provide valuable stimulation for the gums.

The apple actually has been held in high regard since earliest times. The first settlers in North America brought seeds from the apple orchards of their own lands. Indians, missionaries and traders then carried these precious seeds into the wilderness, and in this way apple orchards were started all across the new country.

This was the humble beginning of the vast apple orchards, as we know them today. Only within very recent years, however, have new storage and packaging methods enabled each annual crop to be preserved for perfect eating pleasure throughout the year. Now it is possible to purchase a wide variety of apples at any time from one harvest to another.

Spicy Pink Apple Sauce

Add a few drops of red food coloring and a dash of cinnamon to your own or canned apple sauce. Chill before serving.

Sausage-Apple Skillet

1 lb. pork sausages
1 medium onion, sliced thin
3 tart apples, peeled and sliced
2 tbsp. brown sugar
1 tsp. paprika
½ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. dry mustard
¼ tsp. chili powder
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
½ cup beef bouillon
½ cup grated sharp Cheddar cheese

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Brown sausages slowly in heavy skillet. Drain off all but 2 tbsp. fat and pile sausages at one side of skillet. Add onion and apples to other side of skillet and cook gently until tender.

Combine sugar, paprika, salt, mustard, chili powder, Worcestershire sauce, bouillon and cheese and pour over. Bake skillet tightly with foil and cover 20 minutes. Uncover pan and turn on broiler for about 5 minutes.

Autumn Salad

1 3-oz. orange-flavored gelatin
½ cup boiling water
1½ cups ginger ale
2/3 cup chopped apple
¼ cup chopped celery
½ cup red grapes halved and seeded
2 slices pineapple, drained and cut up

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in ginger ale. Chill until beginning to thicken.

Stir in apple, celery, grapes and pineapple. Pour into individual moulds or paper cups and chill until set.

Candied Sweet Potato and Apple Pies

2 pounds peeled cooked sweet potatoes
2 cups thinly sliced, pared apples
¾ cup brown sugar
¼ cup butter, melted

Mrs. Ken Bailey and family, Barton Street visited over the weekend with her sister Mr. and Mrs. J. Leffy, Peterborough.

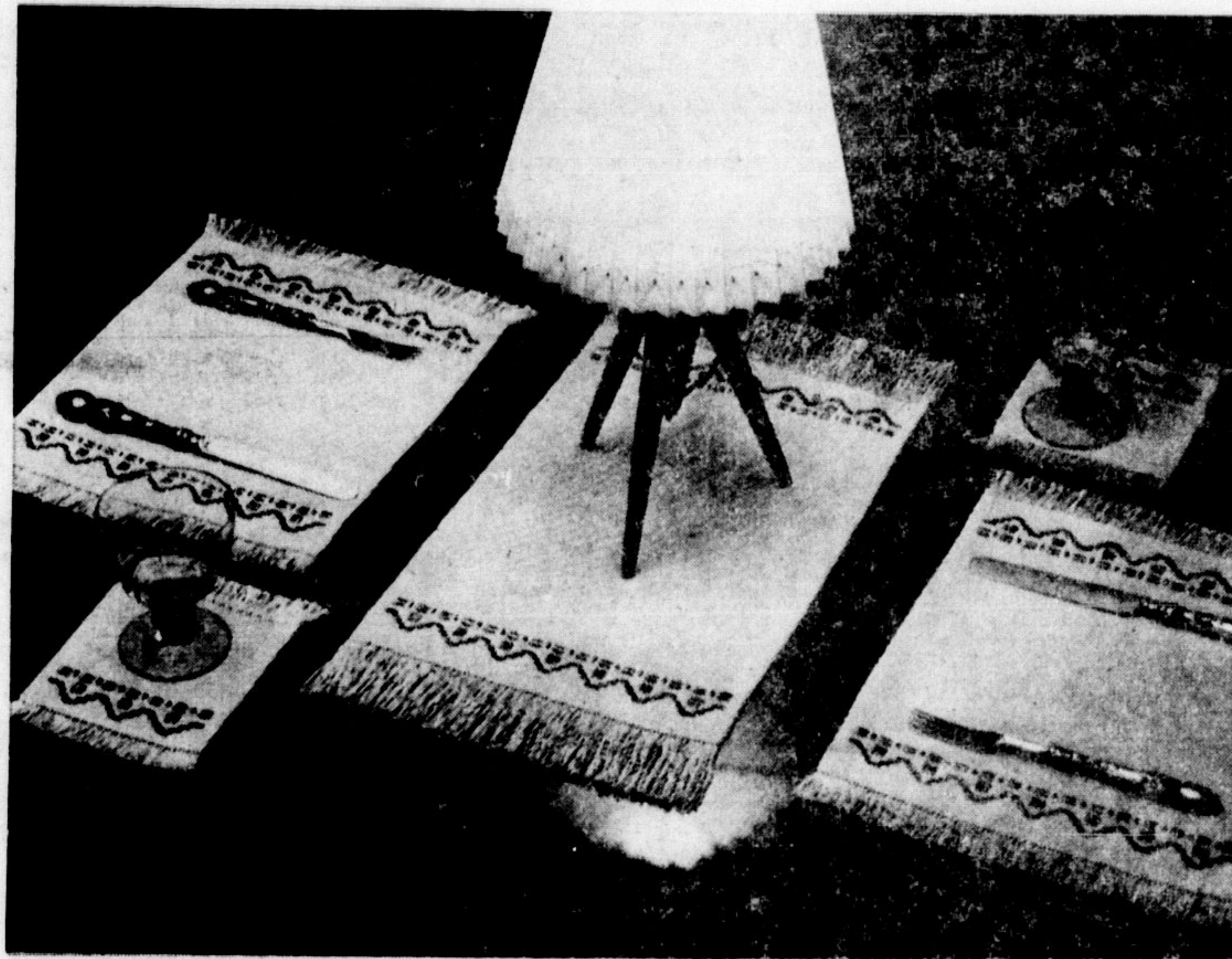
