**RIGHT AROUND HOME**

Honey is an excellent substitute for sugar but there are several facts to bear in mind.

Although honey has approximately the same sweetening power as sugar, it contains more moisture. Therefore, when replacing one cup of sugar with one cup of honey, reduce the liquid by approximately 1/4 cup. Lightly greasing the measuring spoon and cup will ensure that all the honey slips into the ingredients, cutting down waste and increasing the accuracy of the measurements. Add the honey with the liquid ingredients or shortening.

Date Honey Bars will please the youngsters when they come to the back door looking for an afternoon snack. They keep well too, (when high on a shelf, out of reach.)

**Date Honey Bars**

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup honey
- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 cups dates
- 1 cup nuts

Beat the eggs, then beat in the honey. Combine the flour, salt, and baking powder then stir into the honey and eggs.

Put the dates and nuts through the food chopper then add to the batter.

Spoon the batter into a greased 9 x 13 inch pan. Bake at 350 deg. for about 30 minutes. When cool cut in squares and store in tightly covered tin.

**Toffee Raisin Bars**

Lots of sugar, spices and fruit go into these chewy cookies. They save time on busy days, for they take no fancy shaping.

- 2 cups sifted flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
  - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
  - 1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine
  - 1 1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar
  - 2 eggs
  - 2 tablespoons milk
  - 1 1/2 cups raisins
- Measure flour, soda, nutmeg, cinnamon and cloves into sifter. Cream butter or margarine with brown sugar until fluffy in large bowl; beat in eggs and milk until well-blended.

Sift in dry ingredients a third at a time, blending well to make a thick batter; stir in raisins. Spread evenly in lightly greased

jelly-roll pan, 15 x 10 x 1. Bake in moderate oven (375 deg.) 20 minutes, or until browned around edges and top springs back when

lightly pressed with fingertip. Cool in pan on wire rack; cut into bars or squares.

These bars, also make a perfect dinner dessert. Cut in larger squares, top with ice cream or whipped cream.

Have you ever had little beads appear on that golden meringue after it has cooled? Chances are that the egg whites were not beaten enough after the sugar was added. The sugar must be completely dissolved in the whites before baking to give a light, fine textured meringue.
