## Public School Budget Holds Line "Virtually Unchanged" Chairman

The 1963 budget of the Milton Public School Board gained major attention Monday evening, when the board's trustees met for a four-hour meeting at the J. M. Denyes school. Following lengthy discussion on the improvements to be made in 1963 at the J. M. Denyes and W. I. Dick schools, board chairman G. D. Gowland noted preliminary indications are that the budget will be virtually unchanged from last year's. The Board's budget for 1962 was \$283,990.91.

The closing in of the area between the school proper and the kindergarten at the Dick school, was the major improvement to be made at that school, trustee Don Stinson reported.

The trustees learned that the proposed purchase price of the Martin St. school, of \$60,000 was based on \$54,500 building value and \$5,500 land value.

The board approved membership in the School of Business officials for 1963, and in the Ontario Urban and Rural Trustees Association for 1963.

Supervising principal E. W. Foster told the board that attendance was down in January, due to the number of children's disease going around. Mr. Foster noted that Miss M. Gemmell has

said that "in all my years of teaching the percentage of attendance for one month has never been as small as it was in January."

The board approved a grant of \$125 to the Halton Music Festival Association. Permission was given for the children to conduct their annual Junior Red Cross canvas in late February.
