

"POLITICAL PATRONAGE"

I wonder how many of your readers observed the editorial in the Globe and Mail on Monday, March 11, 1963, under the title "Political Patronage?"

It went like this: "When Mr. Howard Green was Minister of Public Works, announcements of Federal Government building projects were made by the Works Department in Ottawa. Mr. David Walker, who took over as Works Minister in 1959, organized what may have seemed to be a politically brilliant practice — announcing projects in the name of the Member of Parliament for the constituency concerned."

"Mr. Walker was defeated in the 1962 general election, and Mr. Green resumed the post on a temporary basis. Once again, announcements were made in the name of the Department. But when Mr. E. Davie Fulton took over as Works Minister, the practice of making works announcements in the form of plugs for local MPs returned."

"At the moment Canada has no Parliament, and consequently no MPs. That fact has not prevented ultimate in the coupling of political plums with works projects are now to be made by the former Conservative MPs themselves to their local newspapers."

"Mr. Fulton's office says that it sees nothing wrong with this practice, if the former Members of Parliament have been associated with the projects. We do."

"First, it was questionable enough to have MPs make announcements of public projects as if they personally were bestowing gifts upon their constituents. Now, these men are not even MPs — they are merely political office-seekers, and as such have no official status."

"Second, it seems that there must be an obvious temptation for the Government to undertake projects that are unnecessary at this time, with the purpose of giving aid to candidates who may be in danger of defeat at the polls."

The Globe and Mail is here criticizing the practice of "former" members of parliament announcing local projects — "former" in their instance means those who are no longer members because of the recent dissolution of parliament."

Here in Halton even though the voters sent a member to Ottawa (who was not of the majority), the government of the day saw fit since the 18th of June, to announce all our projects through the former member. Technically this former member has had no more right, Mr. Editor, than you or I to announce local projects."

Why did the Tory government choose to completely ignore the people's representative in Ottawa? This is the party whose leader is for the "Common Man."

What of the rights of Halton's voters? On April 8 let us ensure that we return to really responsible government.

Rural Residents Pay Less Taxes

Burlington residents received some good news from council on Thursday evening — taxes won't be going up this year.

Rural residents will actually pay less than in former years, while industry and commerce will be asked for more.

The town's budget totalled \$10,256,479 for both municipal and school purposes, with taxpayers providing just under \$6,000,000 of this figure.

Rates are: Urban improvement area, residential 2 mills (no change) commerce and industry 68 (up 1.4); rural area, residential and farm, 53.7 mills (down 0.5), commerce and industry 59.7 (up 0.9).

The town will again this year pay a large amount on capital projects out of current revenue — more than \$450,000 or about 4.5 mills.

PHONES OUT

Telephones service to some Milton customers was interrupted during Tuesday night when a leaking roof at the dial exchange building damaged some equipment, Bell Telephone manager A. Blachford reported Wednesday morning.

The dial exchange building is being extended and during the construction a leak developed in the roof.

Seek Superintendent For Kelso Dam Area

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Plans for another busy season at the Kelso Conservation Area, were formed Thursday at a meeting of the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority.

The group decided to advertise locally for a full time superintendent to supervise the park. Although officials of Glen Eden Ski Club asked permission to use the man for winter supervision at the nearby ski tows, the Authority decided the superintendent could be kept busy all winter on Authority work.

A workshop is planned at the Kelso area, where Authority employees can store tools and repair machinery. A 28 by 35 foot building of brick and block has been proposed.

Okay Camping The Authority has approved group camping at the park this summer. Also approved were wood and concrete slab steps up the side of the dam.

A parking fee is charged motorists wishing to park at Kelso's parking lots, but to date the Authority has not received approval to charge pedestrians who park their cars outside the Conservation Area. Rules of other C. A. are to be studied to see if a pedestrian charge would be feasible.

Other business at the meeting concerned the purchase of properties in southern Oakville as parksites.
