THE MOST INTERESTING ASPECT of the Juvenile tournament from this point of view, was the excellent goaltending. Hap Emms and Ed Stroud, who look after the Pontiac team, deserve a lot of credit for grooming the boys for this championship. The team played heads up hockey throughout the tourney and were fine representatives of the town.

Last year's executive urges the attendance of all persons who will help in keeping minor baseball active in the town.


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
