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Known as "Great White Father" Late Dr. George Darby Honored

Ebenezzer Church was filled on Sunday evening, when tribute was paid to the late Dr. George E. Darby in a special memorial service.
Rev. R. H. Haddock introduced the two narrators, Mrs. Murray Mahon and Mrs. Malcolm Moffat, who gave highlights of Dr. Darby's early life. He was born in Nassagaweya in 1889. At an early age, his family moved to New York State. He took part of his university training in Toronto before his family moved to Vancouver.
He was an ordained minister, as well as a medical doctor. He began his work at the then very primitive Methodist mission hospital at Bella Bella, B.C., in August, 1914. When war broke out, his first thought was to enlist. However, he was assured his place in the army could be more easily filled than that of a doctor for 200 miles of rough Pacific coast.
Greatest Honor
In 1945, the Chinook Indian tribe conferred their greatest honor on him when they made him a chief. His title was "Wo-Ya-La", meaning "The Great White Father". This was the name of the very interesting film of Dr. Darby's life which was shown.
Ebenezzer choir sang "Son of My Soul." Mr. Horace Blyth led in a prayer of praise and thanksgiving.
The offering is to be sent to help carry on the work at Bella Bella, where Dr. Ian Chisholm is taking Dr. Darby's place. Miss Flora Moffat, formerly of Nassagaweya, nursed under Dr. Darby for 15 years and is now assisting Dr. Chisholm.
Mr. Haddock read a letter of appreciation from Mrs. Darby. Dr. George E. Darby died last September. At his request and the wishes of his Indian family, his ashes were taken to be interred at Bella Bella.

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
