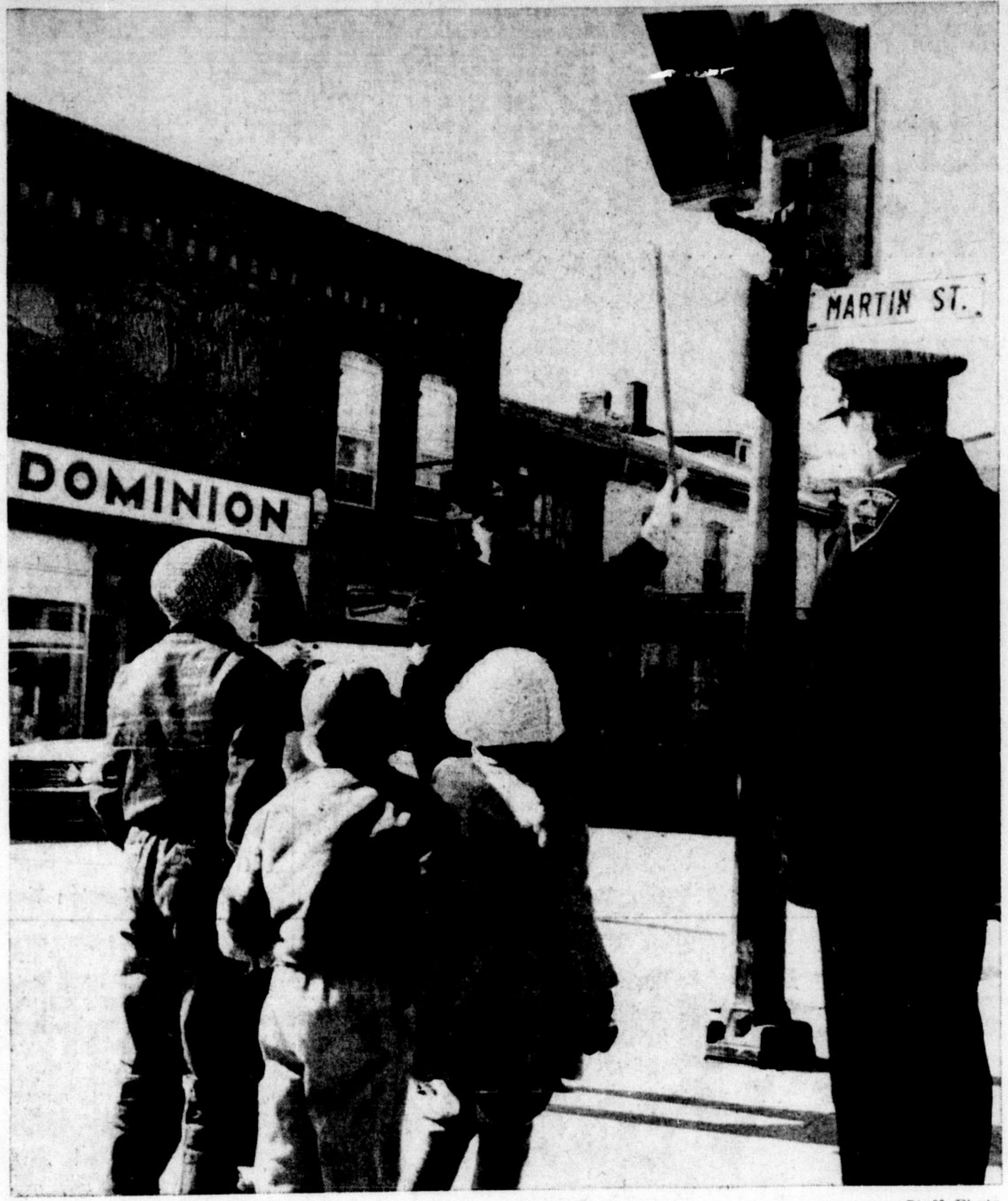
A sincere "thank you" to the people in this district for the warm response given to the canvassers of the cancer drive.

Urges Clean-Up

Chief Backs Beautification

Each year, more than 63,000 Canadian homes are damaged by fire — an average of 170 fires every day. Property loss is estimated at \$28,000,000 according to Milton Fire Chief A. E. Clement.

Of the 400 Canadians who will die in residential fires each year, about half are children. Home fires can be prevented and the fire chief offers these precautions, especially applicable at this time of year when Milton Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a town wide clean-up and beautification campaign:

List Hints

1. Remove matches and other inflammables from the pockets of winter garments before storing.
2. Clean out attics, basements, sheds, garages and other areas where rubbish may have accumulated.
3. Use non-inflammable fluids for cleaning floors and clothing; do not use gasoline or similar volatile fluids.
4. Oily rags, or rags soaked in

turpentine or other fluids, should be destroyed or kept in sealed metal containers.

5. Winter heating materials — oil, kerosene, etc. — should be kept at minimum level during summer months.

6. Chimneys and furnaces should be cleaned thoroughly.

7. Check fans, air conditioners and similar summer appliances for frayed cords or loose connections.

8. Remove accumulated leaves from eaves and around base of homes.

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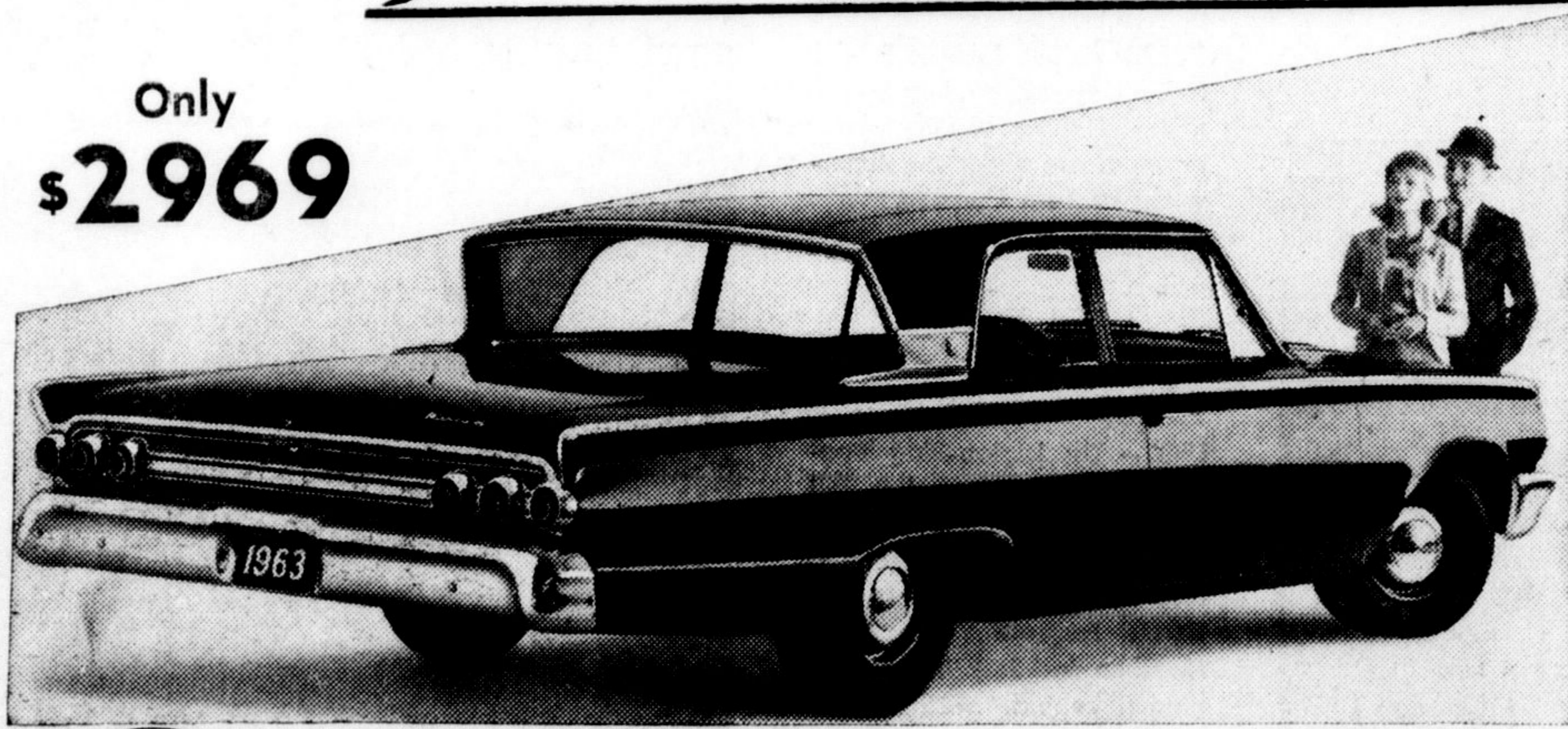
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Elect Robert Mackay, Milton To Head Home, School Council
