

THOUSANDS OF CANADIANS may suffer damage to their good sight if they do not take precautions when viewing the July 20 eclipse. The Canadian National Institute for the Blind says if you watch the eclipse with the naked eye, you may suffer damage to vision for the rest of your life. The CNIB points out that sun glasses, polaroid lens, coloured glass, binoculars and even welder's goggles do not provide sufficient protection for watching the eclipse in safety. Ultra-violet rays of the sun, invisible to the naked eye, focus on the retina. Irreparable burns result which appear as dark patches in the field of vision for the rest of your life. The CNIB suggests the safest method is to view the eclipse on television. A second suggestion - use a large piece of thick glass, heavily smoked in the flame of a candle. And thirdly, expose unused film to the light. Develop it and view the eclipse through at


